Portland has such apparatus, as have much smaller cities in other states. Eugene may need one soon. The cost of a net is said to be in the neighborhood of \$50.

## HENRY DENOUNCES MILTON AURELIUS MILLER

Denver, July 8.—A dramatic scene was enacted at the meeting of the Oregon delegation when C. K. Henry, chairman, scathingly denounced Milton A. Miller, of Lebanon, telling him in the presence of all the other delegates: "I have never known in Oregon such a persistent, egotistical office seeker as you."

The scene took place at the close of a protracted session during which the delegation had sought to settle the disposition of members regarding assignments to various positions in convention affairs.

Henry took a side from the others, with Miller, strongly urging him to withdraw in the interest of harmony and strengthen the position of the party in Oregon, but the Lebanon man firmly insisted that every one keep his promise.

It was then that Henry unreservedly denounced Miller, creating a sensation unprecedented, according to others present.

Henry and others stated that their reason for desiring Miller's withdrawal was that he had been so often honored in the past by the party in Oregon.

The delegation agreed to the following assignments: C. K. Henry, chairman; W. F. Matlock vice-president; J. O. Booth secretary; M. A. Miller national committeeman; R. D. Inman resolutions; D. M. Watson credentials; Lee M. Travis; to notify the vice presidential nominee, D. J. Fry. Henry will control alternates, proxies and tickets.

## JUDGE O'DAY'S DECISION MAKES WORK

City Auditor Bargur said yesterday that he will seek advice from City Attorney Kavanaugh before acting on the decision of Circuit Court Judge O'Day, rendered Monday, which nullifies the present manner of assessing improvements.

The court held that assessment must be in accordance with the benefit to the property assessed, instead of by the plan now followed, which is to levy equally along the improvement. "As I understand the decision of Judge O'Day, it is the duty of the Auditor to view the property in person before levying the assessment," said City Auditor Barbur. "If this is the case, it will be necessary for me to have at least four additional deputies to perform such work, for there is more improvement being done now than at any time in the history of Portland. I understand from what I have heard about the court's decision that he holds the law to require the Auditor to inspect each lot individually. I do not fully see how this could well be done, for if a certain sum were to be levied and the owner of that piece of property should learn from the estimate of the City Engineer that it does not cost that much to do the work there, it seems to me such a person would have a grievance. However, it is a matter that will have to be referred to the city attorney, and I will then act on his advice.—Oregonian.

## SUGGESTIONS FOR THE GOOD OF THE GRANGE.

How can the Grange create public sentiment in favor of what the order stands for? 1st, by being honest in all dealings with the public in all kinds of produce the farmers have to sell. Say, put up all fruit in boxes or packages, attractive for sale, and let everything be just as represented. 2nd, Fruits, vegetables, roots or farinaceous foods, or whatever the farmers have to sell, let us be just as represented. 2nd, to try to bring about a price that is between the selling to the public and the commission merchants who claim to sell for 5 per cent profit, but we have known them in many instances to charge 25 per cent and more than that, when opportunity presented itself. When the time comes that farmers put up nothing but first class goods, and have their own salesmen, you may rest assured that the public will appreciate the quality of the goods for sale, the difference in price being a medium between the commission man and the farmer's price.

3rd, Harmony in the Grange—having a love for all; respecting everybody's rights just the same as our own. Following the Golden Rule, to do unto others, as you would they should do unto you, ever keeping kindness uppermost in our minds, and if a brother or a sister is down, help them up, not waiting to ask why they are down. Thus in our dealings with the world, good attracts good just as evil attracts evil.

4th, A choir of good singers in the Grange is highly appreciated by the farmers and the public, and has a very attractive attention. Just as it is in the large churches in the cities where the people go to hear the singing. It is said of music, "It has charms to soothe the savage beast, to quell the tyrant and soothe the oppressed." As it proved at Inverness, also at the Coliseum when Rome was pagan, but more so since Rome became Christian. It is claimed by the Phenicians and Egyptians when they worshipped in their Temples and the ancient Hindus when they worshipped in the Temple of Carnac.

5th, All mankind being of a social nature, friendship is enjoyed by all that have that organ well developed, but where it is small in some

individuals, they cannot agree with the people that have the organ large, hence every farmer will not join the Grange on account of his organic quality, yet a good man in his sphere of action. Yet at the above figures are carried out the majority of farmers will join the Grange. Also in time others may enjoy the same privilege with the Grange.

6th, In connection with good music and a good quartet of singers, good lectures may be delivered in halls, school districts, and even in neighborhoods, and in private dwellings where parties are agreeable, believing that such meetings would have a good effect socially, and instructive in many ways, and have a tendency to advance the interests of the Grange, to augment its numbers, and also to be appreciated by the public, knowing that the farmers were not only honest in their sayings, but in their dealings also.
