COHEN PASSES WORTHLESS CHECKS AND IS ARRESTED

FORMER JUNK DEALER IN TOILS OF LAW—CAUGHT AT ROSEBURG THIS MORNING—WILL BE BROUGHT BACK TO EUGENE FOR TRIAL

H. A. Cohen, a former Eugene junk dealer, was arrested at Roseburg this morning, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. Constable Plank left on the afternoon train today for that city, and will bring the prisoner back on the morning train tomorrow.

Several days ago Cohen came to Eugene from Portland and loaded a car of junk for shipment to that city. After banking hours he went to Seibert & Dodge's store and presented a check for \$50 on the Merchants' National Bank of Portland, and signed by himself, stating that he needed the money that evening and could not wait until the banks opened the next morning. The firm knew Cohen when he was in business here, and believing that he had money in the bank, gave him the amount the check called for. When presented for collection the check was returned with the mark "no funds." A warrant was at once sworn out for Cohen's arrest and placed in Constable Plank's hands.

It was learned this morning that Cohen also passed a bad check on the Pollock Transfer Company for \$15.

WATER BONDS DELAYED FURTHER BY COUNCIL

The city council met again last night for the purpose of hearing the report of City Attorney Bean as to the legality of the Morris Bros. bid for the water works bonds. The attorney stated that the form of bid would render the sale illegal, according to the city charter, as the bid is practically below par in demanding a commission of one and a half per cent in excess of the par value.

It was finally agreed, after considerable discussion, that Mayor Mallock and City Attorney Bean go to Portland to confer with Morris Bros. to have them change the bid so as to remove the legal objections.

The city engineer presented the plans for paving the park streets.

The matter of the dispute over the width of the alley between the properties of Dr. Blidde and Mrs. Minnie Croner on Olive street, was again brought up and it was agreed that the alley must remain just at its undisputed possession for 30 years.

The city engineer was instructed to locate the alley crossing, giving Mrs. Croner just what her deed calls for, and the city thereby gives up all its rights to any alley room that may have been infringed on by the property holders at those places.
