WILL BUILD GOVERNMENT PHONE LINE

WIRES WILL BE STRUNG FROM LOWELL TO HILL'S RANCH, TWENTY-EIGHT MILES, THIS SUMMER—G. F. REDMOND STARTS OUT TODAY TO BEGIN WORK

G. F. Redmond, an expert in telephone construction work, arrived in Eugene from Portland with his family a few days ago and left this morning for Lowell to begin work on the government telephone line from that place to Hill's ranch, a distance of 28 1/2 miles toward the summit of the Cascade mountains. He was accompanied by Deputy Forest Supervisor J. Harvor, of this city, who will direct the beginning of the work.

The preliminary work of building this line, such as purchasing the material and locating the route, was done last year, and now actual construction of the line between Lowell and the Hill ranch will be done. It was announced by The Guard several months ago that a line would be built by the government to assist the forest service in its work, from Lowell across the summit of the mountains to connect with a line from Prieville and other Eastern Oregon towns, thus giving direct telephone connection from Eugene to those points.

The new line may be used by the public in conjunction with the corporation lines connecting at Lowell and the several points in Crook county. The work of pushing the line across the summit will probably be done next year. All of this work is under the direct supervision of Supervisor C. R. Seltz, whose office is in this city.

Supervisor Seltz says the work of building the trail from McKenzie Bridge, along the summit of the mountains, to the north fork of the Willamette river at Box Canyon, a distance of seven miles, will begin in a short time and will be completed some time during the summer. These improvements are all for the benefit of the forest service. There are now 14 or 15 men at work in this capacity in the Cascades east of here under the direction of the Eugene office.

PAVING CREW AT WORK ONCE MORE.

"DOPE" BEING LAID ON OAK STREET BETWEEN EAST SEVENTH AND EAST NINTH

Once more the Warren Construction Company is laying paving "dope" on Eugene's streets. After completing the East Eleventh street contract over two weeks ago the "dope" crew and mixing plant have been idle until this morning, when the work of paving Oak street between East Seventh and East Ninth was commenced. After Oak street is finished up Olive street will be worked on, and then come the short stretches on West Tenth and West Eleventh streets. The city council has ordered the park streets paved, and they will come next. It is not known whether or not any more paving, aside from that mentioned, will be done this summer, but it is probable that some action will be taken soon on a number of other streets on which the property owners have objected to the pavement.

DIED.

At the General hospital in Eugene, July 10, 1908, Charles Bowen, of Cottage Grove, aged 78 years, of asthma and pneumonia. The body will be taken to Cottage Grove on the 9:35 train tonight and will be buried there Sunday. The deceased leaves a daughter in Seattle, a son in Montana, a son and two daughters in Wisconsin. He came to Oregon from Minnesota 25 years ago, and was for many years section foreman for the Southern Pacific Company at Latham, in the southern end of Lane county. In early days he followed the occupation of a sailor, and has been employed by various railroads in nearly all parts of the United States. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias lodge of Cottage Grove.

McMURPHEY NEGOTIATES FOR BIG WHEAT RANCH

EUGENE MAN MAY BUY 900-ACRE PLACE AT CONDON, IN EASTERN OREGON—DEAL NOT YET MADE

Condon, Or., July 9.—Two of the biggest land deals made here for several months were effected this week by E. Curran and J. O. McElroy. One of the buyers is R. McMurphey, of Eugene, who takes possession of the Skelly ranch, situated one mile north of town, for the consideration of \$28,000. The ranch is well cultivated and is now rented to William Elbert, and is all in crop, one-third of which went to the purchaser. The other ranch was the Wester place, near Clem, which was bought by S. C. Dodson, of this city, for the consideration of \$26,100.

The prices paid for the ranches demonstrate that Gilliam county land is valuable and that the wheat interests have not received a crushing blow on account of reports of poor crops in some sections of the county.
