WATSON ATTACKS PLUTOCRACY'S RULE IN UNITED STATES

POPLIST CANDIDATE OFFICIALLY INFORMED OF HIS NOMINATION—ADDRESS DEALS ALMOST ENTIRELY WITH ALLEGED ENCROACHMENTS OF PLUTOCRACY UPON RIGHTS OF PEOPLE

Atlanta, Ga., July 10.—Thomas E. Watson, candidate of the People's party for president, was formally notified of his nomination by the committee at a largely attended meeting of populists in this city today. The notification speech was by Judge Forest, of Albany, N. Y. Watson delivered a lengthy reply in which he reviewed the work and ambitions of his party. His address was devoted largely to encroachments of wealth upon the liberties of the people, comparing present conditions with those of Rome and other empires of history preceding their fall.

"Suppose you compare the plutocracy of Rome to that of these United States, J. P. Morgan has more

money invested in art treasures alone than the richest of all the Romans was worth. The 'summer cottage' of Cornelius Vanderbilt costs \$3,000,000, to say nothing of the land and furnishings. John D. Rockefeller's yearly income is greater than was the entire fortune of the richest Roman. From one little railroad, the Central of Georgia, J. P. Morgan and a choice assortment of participating thieves, stole a larger sum than Caesar wrung from conquered Gaul. The victorious Sulla astonished historians by levying a fine of \$25,000,000 upon the rich cities of Greece. The Sugar trust levied an annual fine of twice that amount upon this republic a few years ago, to recoup itself for a contribution of \$500,000 which it had made to the campaign fund of the Democratic party. By judicious use of its contributions with both the old parties, the steel trust gets the privilege to so arrange the tariff schedules as to export net profits every year ten times larger than the entire revenue of the Roman republic.

"Antiquity was shocked when Cleopatra dissolved and drank a pearl valued at \$400,000. Historians emphasize the scandalous luxury of Lucullus, who spent \$8500 on a feast. When one of our grand American millionaires throws open the ball room for a night of revelry, the floral decorations alone cost more than the feast of Lucullus. And when one of our Cleopatras is fascinated by some Roman Marc Antony, English duke, Italian prince, French count or Hungarian sneeze-weed, she thinks nothing of spending from one to five million dollars upon the pearl. In Cleopatra's case the gem was merely a casual product of nature; in the modern instance every dollar that goes abroad to pay for foreign titles and minister to the debauched appetites of aristocratic debauchees, is the product of the American laborer's toil."

BRYAN WANTS BUT ONE TERM OF PRESIDENCY

Fairview, July 10.—The following statement was made by Mr. Bryan when he received the announcement of his nomination: "The presidency is the highest official position in the world and no one occupying it can afford to have his views on public questions biased by personal ambition. Recognizing his responsibility to God and his obligation to his countrymen, he should endeavor to discharge his duties with a singleness of purpose. Believing one can best do this when not planning a second term, I announce now, as I have on former occasions, that if elected I shall not be a candidate for re-election. "This nomination is plainly from the people, and my obligation will be purely to the people. I appreciate the honor more because it came not from one person, or from a few persons, but from the rank and file, acting freely and without compulsion."

Sa. Paul, July 10.—Governor Johnson will support Bryan for the presidency, so he announced today.

Lincoln Celebrates
Lincoln, July 10.—In honor of the nomination of Bryan the citizens of Lincoln united in a noisy demonstration this morning. It was purely non-partisan in character.

SYNOPSIS OF PLATFORM MADE BY DEMOCRATS

Convention Hall, Denver, July 10. Following are the most important planks in the Democratic platform:

"We also support the right of congress of this country to have the right to control all railroads in the United States, just as the interstate commerce commission has in each state within its borders.

"We demand such enlargement of the powers of the interstate commerce commission as may be necessary to enable it to protect persons and places from discrimination and extortion, and to compel the railroads to perform their duties as common carriers. We favor the efficient supervision and rate regulation of railroads engaged in interstate commerce.

Valuation of Railroads.
"To this end we recommend the valuation of railroads by the interstate commerce commission, such valuation to take into consideration the original cost of construction and all elements of value which will render the valuation made fair and just. We favor such legislation as will prohibit the railroads from engaging in business which brings them into competition with their shippers.

of Oklahoma, chairman of the committee on resolutions, which built the Democratic platform.

also again that which will insure reduction in their rates as conditions will permit, and not require a reduction in the wages of employes or do injustice to legitimate investments.

"We heartily approve the laws prohibiting the pass and the rebate, and we favor any further necessary legislation to restrain, correct and prevent such abuses."

The currency plank, besides denouncing the Aldrich-Vreeland currency bill passed by the last congress, and favoring the issuance of an emergency currency by the government itself, also denounced the Republicans for distributing the deposit of the government money in national banks in such a manner that it concentrates in central cities, and favors a plan by which the government money may be kept in the localities in which it is raised.

Revision of the Tariff.
"We favor the immediate revision of the tariff by the reduction of import duties. Articles entering into competition with trust-controlled products should be placed on the free list. Material reductions should be made in the tariff upon the necessities of life, especially upon articles competing with such American manufactures as are sold abroad more cheaply than at home; and graduated reductions should be made in such other schedules as may be necessary to restore the tariff to a revenue basis.

"Existing duties have given the manufacturers of paper a shelter behind which they have organized combinations to raise the price of pulp and of paper thus imposing a tax upon the spread of knowledge. We demand the immediate repeal of the tariff upon wood pulp, print paper, lumber, timber and logs and that these articles be placed upon the free list."

Ship subsidies are opposed and improvement of waterways favored, as are banking reform laws, postal savings banks, and publicity of campaign funds.
