The burglar missed Mr. Linn's watch in his vest, hanging next to his trousers, and also overlooked Mrs. Linn's purse, hanging in the hallway and containing several dollars in money. Neither did he attempt to open the silver drawer in the sideboard.

The burglary was not discovered until this morning. When Mr. Linn arose he missed his trousers in their accustomed place, and going downstairs he found them on a chair. He then discovered where the miscreant had lunched.

WINNERS OF OLYMPIC RACES IN ENGLAND

London, July 15.—The final heat in the three-mile team race at the Olympic meet was won by England; the American team was second. Time, 14 minutes, 39 2-5 seconds.

The final in the 600-yard cycle race was won by Johnson, of England; Demange, of France, second, and Neumer, German, third. Time, 51 1-5 seconds.

The final in the 2000-metre tandem cycling race was won by the French team. Two English teams finished second and third. Time, 3 minutes 7 2-5 seconds.

RUSH L. HOLLAND HEAD OF ALL ELKS

Dallas, Tex., July 14.—A monster barbecue was one of the features of the Elks' celebration in this city today. The day was warm, and the marching clubs were not so active as on yesterday. Detroit and Los Angeles are working hard to secure the next convocation.

At today's session of the grand lodge Rush L. Holland, of Colorado Springs, was elected grand exalted ruler without opposition. John D. Shea, Hartford, Conn., was chosen grand esteemed leading knight; Fred E. Robinson, Dubuque, Iowa, was re-elected grand secretary, and Edward Leach, of New York, was re-elected grand treasurer.

Estimates place the number of visitors here at 20,000, but fully 5000 more are expected to arrive before the big parade is held Thursday.

With Portland, Or., sixth, and Oakland, Cal., twelfth among the sixteen leading lodges of the United States, the Pacific coast is making a wonderful showing at the annual convention. Nearly 47,000 new members have been initiated into the order during the past year, 44 new lodges established and only 2317 of a total membership of 284,221 have died. The total number of the lodges in the United States at present is 1125.

Pennsylvania leads the states with a membership of 22,565. New York, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Illinois are next.

SERIOUS FIRE RAGES AMONG OIL TANKS

Santa Barbara, July 15.—Fire which broke out at midnight in the town of Orcutt, an oil shipping town,

had by noon today caused two deaths, destroyed oil tanks and other property valued at \$200,000, and was still threatening two immense pumping stations and another tank. The black smoke is visible for miles, overhanging the country like a dense cloud.

NEW YORK BABIES DIE BY DOZENS IN SUMMER

New York, July 14.—The conference on summer care of babies, which has just ended, has issued a statement in which attention is called to the notable increase in the number of babies now dying of diarrheal diseases. The figures, which are for babies under one year of age, show that in the six weeks from June 1 to July 11 this year the increase over 1907 is 50 per cent for Manhattan and the Bronx, 80 per cent for Brooklyn, 133 per cent for Queens, 55 per cent for Richmond and 66 per cent for all boroughs.

The statement also shows that for the last six weeks diarrheal diseases caused 763 out of 1924 deaths.
