E. F. CHAPMAN'S VIEWS ON THE WATER QUESTION.

Editor Guard: It seems to me our city council is at a loss to know how to get pure water for our young and thriving little city, without adding two hundred thousand dollars more to the three hundred thousand dollars already voted for a tax-driven people to meet in course of time.

Now I wish to say to the honorable city council that a great many of the cities and towns back in the middle west are not troubled along the line of gravity system, and have got water too, and at less than half the expense.

There is a vast sheet of pure water as there is in the world, underlying the city of Eugene, which is to be had only for the digging or boring for it. Dig a well 20 to 30 feet deep, cement it up, put a stand pipe twenty feet in diameter, by one hundred and twenty foot high, put in your pump, which can be run with a gas engine, connect in your mains and hire two men to run it day and night and you have it. The cost of which will not exceed two hundred thousand

and dollars. Wood pipes will not last ten years and they get foul all the same. If you put it before the people for a vote I believe three-fourths of the people will vote for the well and stand pipe system.

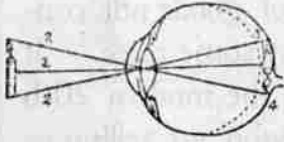
THE EYE AND ITS CARE

MYOPIA OR NEAR-SIGHTEDNESS.
 Myopia or near sightedness is exactly the opposite condition to Hyperopia, which was explained last week. The eyeball being too long from front to back instead of too short as in hyperopia. This is shown in the above drawing, the dotted line being where the retina should be in normal condition.

Myopia has many causes. It may be inherited or it may be caused by an



overdevelopment of the eye in youth. The most general cause is, starting into school very young and doing nearwork. Thereby causing such a strain on the posterior tissues of the eye, which are very delicate, that they are weakened and bulge backward.

Myopic people do not see well at a distance, but see objects held close to the eye very clearly. This trouble is one that must receive the care of the eye specialist as soon as it is discovered, for the chances are that it will gradually grow worse unless checked. Sometimes progressing so far that vision is entirely lost. But by wearing the proper glasses and guarding the eyes very carefully this may be stopped and the eyes saved.

People that are near-sighted should always have the light arranged correctly when they are using their eyes. That is, have it come from over the left shoulder. Never, under any circumstances allow it to shine in the face. They should always work with the head held in an upright position, as working with the head bent over causes an undue amount of blood to rush into the eyes, thus bringing more pressure on those delicate posterior tissues.

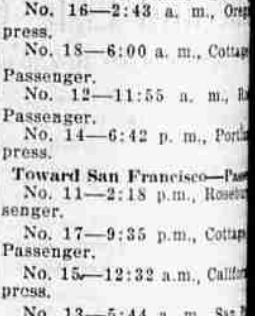
