LIVE TOPICS OF INTEREST TO ENTIRE STATE

(Special Correspondence.)

Portland, Ore., July 20.—The Cortelyou Club, of Brooklyn, N. Y., was represented in Portland Sunday by a delegation of one hundred and twenty-five of its members.

The Cherry Fair at Salem last week was a great success and many were present from Portland and other points.

A contract for \$75,000 for the construction of the foundation of the main building for Swift & Company, to be finished within ninety days, was let last Friday.

The Astoria regatta, with thirty splendid aquatic events, is scheduled for August 27th, 28th and 29th, and the railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip from all points in the state.

The Washington State Press Association enjoyed one of their best annual conventions at Vancouver during three days of last week. A trip up the Columbia River, a trolley ride to Portland and a banquet at Vancouver, were among the features of entertainment.

Judge George T. Baldwin, Vice President of the Oregon Development League, and Mr. W. O. Smith, editor of the Klamath Falls Evening Herald, were in Portland Saturday as a special committee from the Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce to invite the Y. M. C. A. excursion party which goes to Crater Lake August 7th, to arrange their itinerary so as to include a visit to Klamath Falls.

The colonist rates from all points in the East to all points in Oregon commence September 1st and continue until October 31st. Every commercial organization and every citizen of Oregon should begin to make these rates the subject of every letter that goes out of the state.

The fare is \$30 from Missouri River points, St. Paul, Duluth and Winnipeg, \$33 from St. Louis and \$38 from Chicago, with proportionate rates from every point in the United States.

No meeting was ever called in Oregon which has attracted the universal enthusiasm which has been created by the Oregon Good Roads Conference, which is to be held in the Convention Hall, 6th floor of the Portland Commercial Club on Tuesday, August 11th.

An effort will be made to call the meeting to order promptly at 9:30 a. m., so that there may be a morning, an afternoon and an evening session. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip for this occasion.

Delegation representing every grange, the commercial bodies, and the different counties to be appointed by the county judges, are already reporting that they will be present. Every editor in the state is a delegate at large, as is the mayor of every city and every county commissioner. A program is being prepared, but every effort will be made to get rid of long winded speeches and to get down to actual work that will produce results.

The local Southern Pacific officials expect to enter the new depot building August 1, and to give up the old frame building which has been the home of passenger traffic, and will be turned into the freight emporium.

Expectation was held during the spring that the fine brick would be occupied by July 1, but owing to delay in the completion of the furnishings, the real removal was delayed a month.

As the building now stands, however, it is practically complete. The structure is undoubtedly the best south of Portland, if not in any part of the state outside of the metropolis.

Coast Fork Grange met in regular session on Saturday, July 1, at ten a. m. Went through the regular routine of work, and in the afternoon initiated four new members, and the literary part was taken up with considerable enthusiasm.

The division of the county was discussed at some length, but no conclusion was arrived at, the sentiment generally was against the division. SITUATION OF GRIDIRON GAME IN NORTHWEST

The fight for the intercollegiate championship will be watched with interest this year, for all the Northwest conference teams are out to win and are making preparations to that end. The conference teams will be better coached and trained than ever before, and each will put up a higher class of football than has ever been seen in the Northwest.

The presence of such men as Norcross, the ex-Michigan captain, who coached O. A. C. last year, and who has been engaged for another season; Forbes, the great Yale end, who coached West Point last fall, and who has been signed by the Oregon management; Reinhold, Michigan's renowned halfback, who will direct Pullman's gridiron campaign, and Middleton, the little coach who made Idaho famous last year, means that the Northwest will see some football of the real sort before the curtain drops on the season of 1908.

Friends and followers of the Oregon team believe that in Bob Forbes they have found a Moses to lead their football team out of the wilderness. Himself while at New Haven and as head coach at West Point he demonstrated his ability. He is the first Yale man to coach a Pacific Northwest team, and is one of the few all-American men to come to these parts.

Forbes will have a worthy assistant in the person of Arnsperger, Oregon's veteran tackle, who has been disqualified by the four-year rule, and in Bill Hayward he will have one of the best trainers in the West.

It seems quite certain that Owsley and Rockwell, former New Haven stars, who are now located on the Pacific coast, will be on hand for a week or two to assist Forbes and that other Yale men, besides a number of well-known Oregon graduates, will do what they can to build up a football machine that Norcross and his followers cannot smash. The Yale system will be on trial, and Yale men wish it to stand the test and maintain its prestige.

Oregon will begin the season with seven of her veteran players—Moulton, captain and left guard; Scott, center; McIntyre, right guard; Pinkham, left tackle; Coleman, right end; Taylor, right half; Clarke, fullback. There will also be a good supply of old second team men and substitutes as well as a fine bunch of freshmen.

The team will feel the loss of Kuykendall at quarter. Moores at end, Zacharias, the big halfback, and Arnsperger, the reliable tackle. Kuykendall's place will be especially hard to fill, as he was a source of great strength to his team last season.—Oregonian.
