STATEMENT OF PROSECUTION IN BOOTH CASE

Portland, July 20.—That James Henry Booth, when receiver of the Roseburg land office, paid I. Thomas Agee \$300 for a timber claim which the latter deeded to the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company was the opening statement made to the jury this morning by T. C. Becker, who is prosecuting the Booth-Singleton conspiracy case in the federal court. Becker explained that while only 160 acres—a quarter-section—was involved in the transaction, it was the method of acquiring the land by the lumber company and not the acreage that resulted in the indictment of ex-Senator R. A. Booth, J. H. Booth and their brother-in-law, T. E. Singleton.

Becker will complete his statement this afternoon and will be followed by either L. R. Webster or D. J. Malarkey with a statement for the defense. It is possible the first witness for the government may take the stand at a late hour today, this depending on the length of the opening statement of the defense. The government prosecutors say they can submit all their evidence by Saturday but as there are several points which will require argument, it is not believed that the government will be through with its witnesses before the middle of next week.

Thus far the defense has given no inkling as to the character of the defense to be set up, although it is believed they will explain that the money transaction was legitimate and in the nature of a loan.

LABOR LEADERS CITED FOR CONTEMPT

Washington, July 22.—President Gompers, Secretary Morrison and John Mitchell, of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor, were today cited to answer on September 8 next to the charge of contempt in violating the court injunction forbidding them from continuing the boycott against the Buck Stove and Range Co.

RUEF FILES CHARGES AGAINST BURNS

San Francisco, July 18.—An affidavit has been filed in Judge Lawlor's court in which Abraham Ruef charged that 1800 names have been withdrawn from the jury box and the list of these is in possession of Detective W. J. Burns and two of his assistants. Judge Lawlor will hear the matter on Monday.

ONE PORTLAND BUSTED BANK TO BE REORGANIZED

Portland, Dr. July 19.—A new title and abstract company has been organized with strong backing and a credit of \$250,000 to succeed to the plant and business of the old Title Guaranty Trust company and the Security Abstract & Trust company. The new company will be known as the Security Title & Trust company. It will occupy quarters in the northwest corner of the Chamber of Commerce building, now occupied by the Security Abstract & Trust company.

Articles of incorporation were filed yesterday afternoon and the new company will begin business immediately upon completion of extensive remodeling of the latter company's offices in the Chamber of Commerce building. The incorporators are: William M. Ladd, Earl C. Bronaugh, John F. Daly, W. E. Thomas, R. S. Howard, Jr., P. P. Dabney and J. L. Hartman. Final organization and election of officers has not yet taken place.

The purpose of the corporation is to acquire abstract points, to prepare abstract books, to examine public records, to prepare statements of any matter of record, including abstracts and certificates of title, to issue all kinds of contracts and reports affecting titles to real estate, to act as a general and special agent or trustee.

NEW YORK BANKS STILL GAIN IN CASH RESERVE

New York, July 18.—The Financier will say: Contrary to expectations, the Associated Banks of New York City gained largely in cash last week, the statement indicating an increase in this item of \$5,186,400. There was a substantial rise in the loan item of \$8,579,000. In consequence of this increase just noted deposits expanded \$12,320,100. The increase in the reserve requirements called for by the enlarged deposits did not absorb all the cash gained during the week, and in consequence the surplus reserve increased \$1,856,375, to \$51,970,300. These figures are the report of actual conditions, the statement of averages showing larger increases in all items.

The banks are still paying into the treasury public deposits withdrawn by the order of the secretary, and the item of public deposits in the New York Associated Banks is now only \$9,333,000, compared with \$70,000,000 at the beginning of the year. The movement of money away from the interior last week was the smallest of the year, and as the time is at hand when money for crop purposes is needed, it is not likely that the enormous gains which the New York banks have made as a result of the shipments of idle money from all over the country to this centre will continue long.
