## MAKE ROOM FOR ANOTHER FACTORY AT MILL POND

IMPROVEMENTS ARE BEING MADE IN MANUFACTURING DISTRICTS AT AN OUTLAY OF SEVERAL THOUSAND DOLLARS

F. L. Chambers and George Midgley, owners of the Eugene mill race, are making extensive improvements in the property which, when completed, will add a great deal more power and will make room for another factory. A false dam is being built across the pond at the foot of West Sixth street so that new waste gates can be put in and at the same time the factories can use the water for power while the improvements are being made.

Included in the improvements are a new forebay and flume for the excelsior mill, which will add a great deal more power for that plant, also a new forebay and flume for Morgan's furniture factory.

When the improvements are finished there will be room for another wheel and enough water power and some to spare for an additional factory.

### DR. BIDDLE MOVES CURBING IN NIGHT

CITY AUTHORITIES DISCOVER ACTION AND MOVE IT BACK TO ITS ORIGINAL LOCATION

The differences between the city council and Dr. G. W. Biddle over the width of the alley extending along his residence property on Olive street culminated last night by Dr. Biddle moving the cement curbing, put in by the city for the pavement on that street, two feet to the north so that it would be even with the property line. This action on the part of Dr. Biddle was discovered early this morning and soon a number of councilmen and other city officials were on the scene. Mayor Matlock ordered the curbing put back where it was first built, and Street Commissioner Turner and his assistants soon began the work. Dr. Biddle at once consulted his attorneys in regard to enjoining the city from placing the curbing there, but he decided that the expense and trouble would not justify the action. His property line has been established long ago by right of possession of the two feet of ground in question, so he has no fears that the city will make an effort to compel him to move his fence two feet further in, and the members of the city council concede that the property is his, but he argues that if his corner is established why not build the curbing accordingly instead of putting the corner of the curbing two feet inside the established corner.

## ONE THOUSAND MILE RELAY RACE ENDS AT CHICAGO

Chicago, July 21.—The Y. M. C. A. relay race, which began in New York at 10 o'clock last Wednesday morning, ended at the city hall in Chicago today at 9:28 a. m. The messengers carried a greeting from Mayor McClellan of New York to Mayor Busse of Chicago, who, however, was not present to receive it when the last messenger presented himself at the city hall. The race covered one thousand miles, and hundreds of boys of the age of 12 to 21 years took part. The time was 119 hours and 22 minutes.  
Mayor Busse's absence was due to the fact that he did not expect the runners until this afternoon.

### PIONEER OF 1851 DIES AT JASPER

Miss Sophronia Briggs Hills, commonly known as "Grandma" Hills, died at the home of her son, Sheridan Hills, near Jasper Sunday morning.  
She lacked just one month of being 80 years old, having been born at Athens, Ohio, on August 28, 1828.  
When young her parents moved to Fort Madison, Iowa, where she was married to Cornelius J. Hills February 19, 1851, immediately starting across the plains by the overland route to the Pacific. They arrived early in the fall of the same year and settled on what is now known as the Hills donation claim at Jasper. Her husband died ten years ago at the family home.  
She was the mother of eight children, all of whom survive her. They are: Mrs. Mary Smith, Henrietta Jacoby, Jetha Humphrey, Jasper, Joe, John, Jordan, Sheridan and Elijah, all residing in Lane county except John, who is in British Columbia. A sister, Elmira Parsley, who was at her bedside, and a brother, William Briggs, who resides at Creswell, also are still living. Besides the eight children there the 32 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.  
The deceased joined the Christian church in Ohio when thirteen years old, and after coming to Oregon she continued relationship with that denomination.  
The funeral was held Monday, at 11 o'clock, with interment in Mount Vernon cemetery. The grandsons were pallbearers. The sermon was preached by Rev. R. G. Callison.  
Her burial was attended by a large number of sorrowing relatives, neighbors and friends, who assembled to pay their deepest respect to a long and noble life.

### WILL HEREAFTER VAG ALL HOBOS

THREE KNIGHTS OF THE ROAD GIVEN TIME ON STREETS BY POLICE JUDGE DORRIS

Hereafter all hobos and idle persons with no visible means of support who appear on the streets of Eugene will be "vagged" by the police. Such was the declaration made by Chief of Police Farrington today. Lately the knights of the road have been numerous in Eugene and heretofore they have not been molested, but during the past two weeks there have been several burglaries about the city, and the work is credited to the hobos. Three of them were jailed last night and were each given four days on the streets by Judge Dorris this morning. Later in the day the chief found seven in the park and he ordered them out of the city on the penalty of being "vagged." They skidded in quick order and have not been seen since. This is a good way to clear up the city of idle criminals, as the average hobo is as averse to work as he is to soap and water.

### STRUCK DOWN BY FALLING TREE

This afternoon about four o'clock a portion of one of the big maple trees in front of the Bangs Livery Company's stables was cut down. As it fell J. R. Fall, riding a bicycle, happened to be passing along the street. The stable employes and those who were cutting down the tree called to him to look out, but he evidently did not hear them or thought he could get past before it fell, but the top branches struck him and bore him to the pavement. Those who witnessed the incident thought the man must have been killed, but he soon emerged from the mass of leaves and small limbs, smiling as if nothing had happened. He was scratched up some and his bicycle was slightly damaged. Had he been nearer the stable the larger limbs of the tree would have struck him and he would have either been killed or seriously injured.

The Judge gave the boy some good fatherly advice and warned him if he ever appeared in court again for a similar offense he would give him the maximum penalty. Hanavan was one of the participants in the boxing match at the Orpheum theatre the other night.

### LOOKS GOOD FOR SIUSLAW HARBOR

J. B. Cushman, of Acme, is in the city, having returned last night from Portland, where he went a few days ago to look after the preliminary details of presenting the bill before the legislature to bond the western portion of Lane county for the improvement of the Siuslaw river bar. Judge Carey and other leading attorneys of Portland drew up the bill, and it is now ready for introduction into the legislature. The government engineer at Portland promised the use of the government's plant already at the mouth of the Siuslaw to assist the citizens in their work. Mr. Cushman says everything looks better than ever before for a successful consummation of the plans to improve the harbor.
