

EUGENE FIRMS MAY ESTABLISH RIVAL PLANTS

SMALL ELECTRIC DYNAMOS ARE CONTEMPLATED AS REMEDY FOR HIGH RATES—CAMPBELL-FELLMAN, ELECTRIC AND DREAMLAND THEATRES FIRST INNOVATORS.

Small independent electric light plants are expected to be installed by some of the leading business men soon. High rates for electricity is the cause. Since the city has purchased the water plant, and arrangements can be made at reasonable rates for water power, the little dynamos so common all over the country are expected to prove a saving proposition.

The Campbell-Fellman company and the Electric and Dreamland theatres will probably be the first enterprising innovators. In case the first experiments are successful, a number of other heavy users are certain to follow the initiative of these promoters.

The probability of great extension of the independent dynamo is small for the reason that the Willamette Valley company when threatened by such independent competition is sure to lower rates. Thus it may be that problems of high light service will be solved soon, without overloading the pumps of the municipal water plant. However, it is quite possible that the electric light company may choose to let those desiring to manufacture their own electricity draw their power from the water system, which is pumped by electric power belonging to the same concern which furnishes Eugene lights.

Small dynamos are not costly in the first investment, nor in operation. Many farmers operate them from streams with very little care. Any man can look after a plant, it is said, with 20 minutes attention a day. The dynamos rarely give serious trouble and do not need the presence of an electrician for successful operation.

In some cases the price of light service in Eugene has been very high. During the summer months one store which closes every night at 6 o'clock, excepting Saturdays' is charged from \$18 to \$20. In the case of theatres, where the amount of electricity used

is enormous, the saving may be even greater. An electric dynamo has been in operation at the excelsior mill for two or three years. It works well and gives little trouble, the expense being small.

Irons, of the Chicago Athletic Club, took first place with a leap of 24 feet 6 1/2 inches, making a new Olympic. Kelly jumped 22 feet 3 1/2 inches, which was the best he could do.

London, July 22.—G. S. Dole, of Yale University, won the final in the catch-as-catch-can wrestling match, defeating Slim, of England. The match was close, the American at last demonstrating his superiority.

ATLANTIC FLEET WILL GO SOUTH

Honolulu, July 21.—The Atlantic battleship fleet has finished coaling and the final preparations are being made to resume its journey around the world tomorrow, when sail will be set for New Zealand and Australia. The flagship will leave her wharf at 2:30 p. m. tomorrow and the fleet will raise anchor and sail at 6 p. m.

Five thousand men from the fleet were granted shore leave today. There was an excursion to Pearl Harbor for the officers this afternoon and tonight a grand ball was held in honor of the sailors and marines. The days' festivities closed with fireworks and an illumination of the fleet.

It has been arranged that the hospital ship Relief shall accompany the fleet to the Antipodes and that the Minnesota shall remain behind to await the arrival of mail, which is coming from San Francisco on the steamer Virginian, and rejoin the fleet before it reaches New Zealand.

LYNCHING IN PROSPECT AT BUTTE, MONT.

Butte, Mont., July 21.—Paddy Rogers, boasted bad man and all-around desperado, is in jail for the murder of Michael Henry in a saloon upon the outskirts last Saturday night. Henry was carried from his home to the cemetery three miles away upon the shoulders of thirty miners, who took this dramatic method of protest against the lawlessness reigning in Butte.

The Henry murder occurred during a saloon hold-up. While his hands were up Henry was shot through the heart at close range. The men engaged in the robbery were masked, but several witnesses declare the murderer is Rogers.

Rogers was tried and acquitted a few years ago for the murder of an old man in a saloon brawl. When a mere boy he was wanted on a robbery charge, and fled into the hills, rifle in hand, and defied the police for weeks. He was captured later near Lewiston, Mont., brought home and finally dismissed. He has figured in several shooting scrapes with the police.

Lynching is now openly talked of, if Rogers' identity as the masked murderer of Henry is established.
