SUSLAW RESERVE IMPROVED BY THE GOVERNMENT

A. E. Cohoon, supervisor of the Suslaw district of the Umpqua forest reserve, will have this season forty or fifty miles of trail as several miles of road built in his district, which will be of much benefit to settlers as well as to the government. The road-way is being built between Waldport, in Lincoln county, and Canal creek, near the boundary line of Lincoln and Lane. The funds for the construction work have been appropriated by the county commissioners of Lincoln county, the government and the settlers, who have donated labor. The road is of importance to development, for heretofore the only route of ingress and egress has been by the Alsea river, and the dairy interests of that stream have suffered because of the difficulty of bringing cattle. The roadway will probably be finished sometime next month.

The trail which the men under Supervisor Cohoon are now working on, is in Tillamook county. As soon as completed, work will probably begin on a trail from near Canal creek just over the line in Lincoln county from Lane to the Suslaw country. Both of these trails are constructed entirely by the government. However, both will be of use to settlers, particularly the one in Tillamook.

Mr. Cohoon leaves tomorrow for Tillamook county on a tour of inspection.
