NEW TEACHERS MEAN GREAT DEAL TO UNIVERSITY

The addition of the new instructors to the teaching force of the State University will mean much for the work of that institution. The rapid growth in the number of students has greatly crowded many departments and some, like the department of geology, have been without a head for some time. The correspondence school will be much stronger than last year and the new man in the department of political science will greatly strengthen the course preparatory to law. The work of the library will be greatly expanded.

"It will be the policy of the University to secure the best possible men for all other positions," said President Campbell today. "For the real success of any school is measured by the worth of its teaching force. No college on the coast has a better instructional force than the University of Oregon, and every effort will be made to keep the standard at the highest. I have a large number of applications for each position to be filled and during my trip East shall select the men who are best qualified for the work."

The silver cup offered by J. O. Watts, of Eugene, to the freshman athlete who made the best record, both in scholarship and on the track, has been awarded to Chester A. Downs, of Portland.
