EUGENE MEN BUY CORVALLIS LUMBER PLANT

H. C. MAHON, DR. T. W. HARRIS
AND GLENN BASSETT SECURE
SAWMILL FROM SUNSET LUM-
BER COMPANY—LATTER MADE
GOOD PROFIT ON DEAL IN FEW
WEEKS

Purchasing the Corvallis Lumber mill a few weeks ago from Allen & Buoy, the Sunset Lumber Company, of Eugene, yesterday sold the mill, the purchasers being Dr. T. W. Harris and H. C. Mahon, of Eugene, and Glenn Bassett, superintendent of the Booth-Kelly mill at Springfield. Mr. Mahon is president of the Sunset Company.

The Sunset people acquired the Corvallis property at what was considered a low figure, and it is said sold for a splendid profit. The figures are not given out for publication. E. O. Samuels, superintendent of the Sunset Company's mill and one of the principal stockholders, is now in Corvallis attending to the work of getting the mill in shape to operate to its full capacity. It has been operating on a small scale for a week or more. Mr. Samuels will remain in Corvallis for a month in charge of the property, until the new owners are prepared to take full charge.

The new owners intend to soon increase the capacity of the mill from 30,000 feet of lumber per day to 50,000 feet.

Mr. Mahon, who owns a third interest in the plant, will still retain his interest in the Sunset Company's mill, although the two will have no connection with each other so far as ownership is concerned. Mr. Bassett is one of the best sawmill men on the coast. He will be manager of the new company.

PROMINENT BROKER SUSPENDS BUSINESS

San Francisco, July 30.—Frederick Dorr, a broker, with offices in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Salt Lake, Butte and Spokane, a member of the New York Stock Exchange and Chicago board of trade, has telegraphed from Chicago to the local manager to suspend business. Lack of patronage, due to dull times, is the cause given. Dorr is well-known socially on the Pacific coast.

WHEELER TO ENTER Y. M. C. A. IN JAPAN

Mark Wheeler, a former University student, and a Eugene boy, expects to go to Tokio, Japan, next winter to take up Y. M. C. A. work. He is now at home spending the summer, after a course in the University of Chicago.

Wheeler is enthusiastic about his work. He has a host of friends in Eugene, having been raised in this vicinity, and was a student at the Eugene high school and the University for several years.

Roseburg, Ore., July 29.—Pursuant to instructions received from Portland, Marshal Norman this morning arrested Mary Bell, of that city, who together with three men, was found in a boxcar. They are all held on a criminal charge awaiting further advice from Portland regarding the girl and her consorts.

The girl claims to be 18 years of age and says she has no intention of returning home to her parents, who she says, live in East Portland. She claims to have been working in a laundry in that city, and upon losing her position she started to San Francisco to procure a similar one. Two of the men with her came from Portland, and the other man, also a transient, joined them here.

Attempt to Revise

Lenox, Mass., July 29.—After an all-day conference of leading government prosecuting officers and Frank B.
