## HITCHCOCK DESIRES GOVERNOR HUGHES BE RENOMINATED

July 31.—Frank H. Hitchcock, chairman of the Republican committee, today held a conference with the New York state committee, while declining to define his position concerning the renomination of Governor Hughes, the visitors expressing the opinion that he expects to name the governor in the West. Hitchcock is in favor of the nomination of Hughes, but the national ticket is not yet decided.

July 31.—Judge Taft is free from politics today. He has constituted his plans for the coming year. Letters of congratulatory messages were received from Minnesota before his speech of acceptance.

### LABOR SITUATION IN FRANCE ACUTE

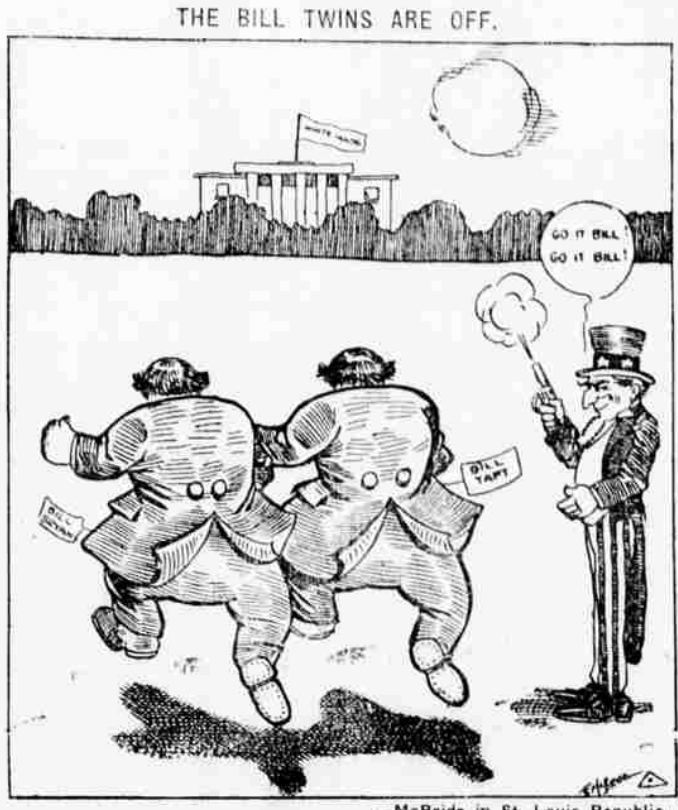

Conservative papers are united in demanding this action, and the organization is expected to fight bitterly for its existence.

## BOOTH CASE GOES TO JURY LATE TONIGHT

ARGUMENTS OF ATTORNEYS NOW IN PROGRESS AND WILL BE FINISHED WITH JUDGE'S INSTRUCTIONS BY MIDNIGHT—VERDICT EXPECTED BY EARLY MORNING

Portland, July 31.—Before sunrise tomorrow the jury in the Booth-Singleton conspiracy case will probably have returned its verdict. Final arguments are being made today and in order to get the case in the hands of the jury without further delay there will be a session tonight.

The opening argument for the prosecution was made all morning and part of the afternoon by United States District Attorney John McCourt. He was followed by D. J. Malarky, who was selected from the four attorneys for the defense to make the summing up for the defendants. Malarky will not finish by the supper hour and will complete his argument in the evening. Judge T. C. Becker will close the argument for the government tonight. The instructions to the jury have been prepared by Judge Wolverton, and before midnight it is supposed the jury will retire for deliberation.

As usual, there is considerable speculation as to the result of the trial. The government appears satisfied that there will be a conviction of at least one or two of the defendants, if not all three. On the other hand, the defense contends that it will be an acquittal for R. A. Booth, James Henry Booth and T. E. Singleton. As one of the jurors is ill and as they have been together for several weeks, the jury may be expected to arrive at its verdict within a short time after retiring from the court room.

Yesterday afternoon the court overruled the defendants' motion for nonsuit.

## SOLDIERS AND NEGROES ENGAGE IN LIVELY RIOT

Rehoboth, Del., July 31.—The state militiamen encamped near here and a crowd of negroes engaged in a riot last night, in which one man received a fractured skull and may not survive, and more than a score of others were injured.

While the soldiers were standing about the merry-go-round, words passed between the colored bystanders and soldiers, when a negro hurled a brick which struck a private on the head, fracturing his skull. Instantly the soldiers, taking their arms, began pursuing every colored man they could find.

Governor Lea, who is in camp, sent a detachment of soldiers to arrest the negro who threw the brick, and the officers used every effort to pacify the enraged soldiers. Quiet was finally restored.

## TWO VICTIMS OF AUTO SMASH-UP

Philadelphia, July 31.—Driving a big touring car across the Reading tracks last night Charles Humphreys, chief clerk of the bureau of police, and Harry Bromley, a prominent dealer in upholstering materials, met a horrible death. Portions of their mangled bodies were scattered along the tracks for a hundred yards, and except for the contents of their pockets identification would have been impossible.

## GOVERNOR LITTLE IS NERVOUS WRECK

St. Joseph, Mo., July 31.—Governor John S. Little, of Arkansas, has been placed in a sanitarium here. He has been suffering from nervous breakdown since the election, which has developed into acute melancholia.

## KILLED HIMSELF AND TWO CHILDREN

Hartford, July 31.—Leonard Hendrick, aged 31, during the absence of his wife last night, killed himself and two little daughters with gas. He left a note for Mrs. Hendricks, saying "Goodbye," and expressing the hope that she would find a better husband.

and announcements for the normal schools have gone to press and will be ready in a few days. Under the new plan all the schools are managed by a single board of regents, and one catalogue for all the schools was deemed sufficient by the board. The Drain school is not included in the new announcement; in fact, the board is about to sign a contract with the school board at Drain to lease the normal school buildings and equipment for public school and high school purposes at Drain.

The announcement contains, besides the usual catalogue material the policy of the schools, the uniform student regulations at all the schools, the uniform course of study adopted by the executive committee of the board of regents, and the uniform marking system.

The description is general in nature and the purpose is to advertise the Oregon normal school system rather than any one school.

The adoption of one announcement for the three schools reduces the expense materially, for only one catalogue will now have to be mailed to prospective students, where four were formerly. The catalogue is one number of a normal school bulletin, to be published quarterly.

In view of recent developments it is considered almost certain that there will be no further effort to maintain the Drain school.

Trial of the cases for alleged violation of the Sunday closing law at Roseburg was held yesterday afternoon before Justice J. T. Long. Each defendant demanded a separate trial and a jury was empaneled to try the cases. In the case of E.
