**INTERESTING CONTEST CLOSES IN KANSAS**

Topeka, Kas., July 31.—One of the most interesting Republican campaigns that Kansas has known in many years is practically ended, and from end to end the State is awaiting with the keenest interest the results of the general primary next Tuesday. In its outcome is involved the governorship and the question of who shall be the Republican senator in the United States congress from this State to succeed Chester I. Long.

There is also involved the nomination of candidates for minor State offices, for congress, for legislative, county and township places.

Senator Long is opposed in his contest for re-election by Joseph L. Bristow, who was formerly Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General. For a number of weeks the rival aspirants have been engaged in a lively campaign that has carried them to every nook and corner of the State. The managers of the Long campaign appear to feel every confidence in the result. Nevertheless they have taken no chance of becoming victims of over confidence, and are keeping up the fight with unabated vigor to the very end. The long forces have had the benefit of a splendid political organization that extends its ramifications through every county of Kansas. They expect to win out by a good, safe majority that will leave no doubt as to the result. The Bristow forces, on the other hand, are likewise claiming the victory, though their claims are not so expansive as the Long claims.

Bristow has made a good fight for the toga and his friends expect him to show up well in the primary, even though he may not win out. His attacks on Senator Long undoubtedly have given that statesman some anxious moments. President Roosevelt is exceedingly popular with the Republicans of Kansas and Mr. Bristow has made one of his strongest points against his opponent by charging the Senator with insincerity, in support of the President and his policies. He also charges Senator Long with being in too close sympathy with the railroads and other large corporations.

The contest for the Republican nomination for Governor to succeed Governor E. W. Hoek is even more bitter than the senatorial struggle. In the gubernatorial contest the lines are sharply drawn. The two candidates are W. R. Stubbs and Cyrus Leland.

Stubbs has conducted his fight by waging war on the machine element. He proclaims himself a square dealer and pleads for honesty and decency in the conduct of State affairs. He has arraigned those in power as the leaders of a faction that has bartered public offices as so much merchandise. He says it is time to get away from the old system of grafting and boodling if the Republican party is to be saved from defeat, and he points to himself as the instrument through which the political reform may be accomplished. He charges the machine with having blocked all reform legislation until he (Stubbs), and his band of square dealers came to the legislature and demanded, and forced the reform measures now on the statute books. He declares that if he is elected governor Kansas will lead the States of the Union in greater reforms for the people.

Cyrus Leland, the opponent of Stubbs, was formerly the national Republican committeeman from Kansas and a personal friend and adviser of President McKinley. He has lived in Kansas more than fifty years and has contributed more to the State's political history than any other citizen. He is a practical politician and his organization reaches every voting precinct in the State. His name is as famous to Kansans as is that of Joseph G. Cannon of Illinois, or William B. Allison of Iowa. He is a typical representative of "practical" politics.

Between Stubbs, the representative of the LaFollette school of politics, and Leland, the "practical" politician, the issue is clean out. Stubbs expects to win through an uprising and a whirlwind, which his political opponents believe will not materialize in next Tuesday's primary. Leland must win through his superb organization, which admittedly never was in better shape to bring about success at the polls.

**KETCHEL MEETS HUGO KELLY IN RING TONIGHT**

San Francisco, Cal., July 31.—The names of Stanley Ketchel and Hugo Kelly are to be heard today wherever sporting men congregate. These two great fighters are to meet in the Coliseum tonight in one of the most important fights that has been pulled off here in a long time, and the stake is the middleweight championship of the world.

The contest is attracting much attention. Ketchel and Kelly are regarded as two of the most brilliant fighters that have been before the public since the days of Bob Fitzsimmons and Jack Dempsey. Kelly has the benefit of a longer experience in the ring, but Ketchel makes up in cleverness and hard-hitting qualities what he lacks in experience. He has risen to the top of his division within the last year and a half, and from the time that he first appeared as a national character he has swept everything before him. If he wins from Kelly tonight he will finish with the list of prominent middleweights by taking Joe Thomas next month.

Both fighters have been training faithfully for several weeks and they are in superb condition for the contest. If outward appearances and the statements of their managers count for anything, the contest will be limited to twenty rounds, according to the articles of agreement.

**ITALIAN DYNAMITER WILL HANG TODAY**

Revelstone, B. C., July 31.—This is the date fixed for the execution of Francesco Cedio, a member of an alleged "Black Hand" society, whose crime and trial attracted widespread attention. The crime for which Cedio was given the death penalty was the blowing up by a dynamite bomb of the Niagara Hotel, at Grand Forks, B. C., about two years ago. The outrage followed the receipt by the proprietor of a number of letters demanding money. The bomb resulted in the killing of Louise King, the daughter of the proprietor, and the injury of several others.

"Doc" Williams to Hang  
 San Antonio, Texas, July 31.—The execution of "Doc" Williams, who made a sensational escape from the Bexar county jail two weeks ago, takes place today within the confines of that institution. The crime of which Williams was convicted was the murder of Thomas J. Turner, a man who had befriended him. The murder occurred on the Liveria road last April, and the murderer made an unsuccessful attempt to hide his crime by burning the body of his victim. His trial took place here in May and resulted in a speedy conviction.

**WORK BEGINS ON TWO NEW RAILROADS**

Brownsville, Or., July 30.—Work on the new railroad up the Calipoolia river from Brownsville has commenced. Ties are now being placed along the proposed route.

The new line is badly needed. It will open up one of the finest dairying and fruit sections of the county, besides giving an outlet for the millions of feet of lumber sawed by the mills in the Calipoolia valley. A new switch has been placed at Brownsville by the Southern Pacific for the big cannery.

Dallas, Or., July 29.—That a railroad between Dallas and Salem will be running in full operation within fifteen months is now an assured fact. Engineers in the employ of the Salem-Falls City & Western Railroad Company have been out over the line for the past month engaged in making surveys. This work has been practically completed and contractors will be put to work as soon as the necessary details are completed. It is understood that Leadbetter, of Portland, Spaulding, of Newberg, and other wealthy men in Portland are backing the line.

**DIAMOND MINES HAVE CLOSED DOWN**

Kimberly, July 31.—The close of the DeBeers diamond mine, which shut down today for an indefinite period, is attributed directly to the slump in the diamond trade in America. For more than a year the American imports have been steadily decreasing until they reached a figure that seriously threatened the diamond trade of the world. The De Beers Company, faced by the necessity of further retrenchment, decided to shut down the DeBeers mine, which is the largest of the group of mines owned by the famous syndicate.
