RIFLEMEN PICKED FOR TRIP EAST

Riflemen who will represent the Oregon National Guard in the National rifle competition at Camp Perry, O., next month were selected yesterday at the Salem rifle range, following two days of competitive work among the 19 expert shots who qualified at the recent state competition for position on the National team.

Fourteen men were chosen after the rifle course had been gone over twice. The selections were made according to scores, the best shots being selected, in accordance with an order issued by Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer last week. NO ENGINEER AT THE TESTING PLANT

The government's forestry department has decided not to keep a man permanently in charge of the timber testing plant at the University, and the property will be incorporated into the regular engineering department.

Professor Joseph Knapp was in charge, but has been transferred to Seattle. The machinery was appropriated by the state, on the condition that the forestry department keep an engineer here in charge of the plant. For two years extensive tests on Oregon timbers, mostly from the Booth-Kelly plant, were made, with very good results. The original cost of the machinery was \$5000.

GANS AND NELSON TO FIGHT AGAIN

San Francisco, July 29.—Fight fans are assured today of another chance to see Gans and Nelson mix things for the lightweight championship of the world.

James Coffroth signed the two little fighters last night for a 45-round go at Colma on Admission day, September 9. Forfeits of \$2,500 on each side were posted today to bind the match. Nelson dictated the terms of the fight and has the better of it in financial matters.

The fighters are to divide 70 per cent of the gate receipts, the winner taking 60 per cent and the loser taking 40 per cent. Nelson will have a two-thirds interest in the moving pictures, Gans having given up his right to any interest in this feature.

Eddie Smith is to referee the fight. The fighters are to weight 123 pounds at the ringside. The fight will be pulled off in the afternoon. Nelson will stay in the east for three more weeks and then come west to begin training.

THREE CARLOADS OF TELEPHONE EQUIPMENT

Manager J. E. Heaton, of the Telephone Company, received word this morning that three carloads of telephone equipment were on the way to Eugene from San Francisco, and that one had already arrived. Mr. Heaton was happy, for he thought it was the material for the improvement and enlargement of the central office and of the lines in the city. He was disappointed when he learned that it was the material for the toll or long distance lines. He is expecting the material for the local improvements every day, and when they arrive the work of making the \$20,000 improvements to the local system, which was begun with the laying of conduits for underground wires several weeks ago, will be resumed.

MAY FORM VALLEY RACING CIRCUIT

In order that Albany may be properly represented at the convention of horsemen to be held here in August, it is requested that businessmen who are interested in the establishment of a racing circuit, horsemen and others meet in the rooms of the Commercial Club on Friday evening, July 31st, at 7:30 o'clock, when a temporary organization will be effected and a delegate chosen to represent Albany in the convention.

The establishing of an amateur racing circuit, composed of towns situated in the Willamette valley, such as Albany, Salem, Eugene, Seaside, Hillsboro, Independence, Clatskanie, McMinnville, in conjunction with Portland, is now regarded as certain. Manager Davenport of the Commercial Club, in conjunction with J. G. Woodworth, has been in correspondence with the officers of the Riverside Driving Club of Portland, by which organization is due the credit for taking the initiative in establishing the new racing circuit.—Albany Democrat.
