REAR ADMIRAL DAYTON RETIRES FROM COMMAND

Washington, D. C., July 31.—Rear Admiral James H. Dayton, commander in-chief of the Pacific fleet, is to be relieved from the duty today and will proceed to his home to await his statutory retirement for age in October. Rear Admiral Dayton is succeeded in command of the Pacific fleet by Rear Admiral William T. Swinburne, who has been in command of the second squadron of the fleet.

Admiral Dayton, whose active career in the navy is brought to a close, has had about twenty-four years' service at sea. He is from Indiana, and entered the navy in September, 1862. He reached the grade of Rear Admiral in February, 1906, when he was appointed to the command of the Pacific fleet and took the armored cruiser division of the fleet from New York to the Philippines and then to the California coast.

Admiral Swinburne, the new commander of the Pacific fleet, is sixty-one years old and a native of Rhode Island. He graduated from the Annapolis Academy in 1866 and since that time has seen service in all parts of the world. He had a prominent part in the naval operations in West Indian waters during the war with Spain and later joined Admiral Dewey's fleet in Manila. From 1902 to 1904 he was the commander of the battleship Texas.

CAMPBELL STARTED FOR THE EAST TODAY

President P. L. Campbell started this morning on his trip East to select from a number of applicants additions to the faculty. He will first go to Chicago and Indianapolis. After that he will visit educational centers and interview the men he has in mind for positions. The board of regents authorized him to make selection of five or six men or women. The president expects to return in about four weeks.

PLACE OF RECREATION FOR THE SOLDIERS

During the encampment at American Lake, Washington, the Young Men's Christian Association of Oregon, Washington and Idaho will conduct two large tents which will be for the use of the enlisted men and officers of the regular army and national guard. One tent will be used for correspondence, reading room and recreation. The other will be for entertainments and meetings in the evening. Free stationery will be furnished by the association, bearing the camp letter-head, and postage stamps and postal cards will be on sale. The tents will be equipped with phonographs, pianos, etc., and will be open to the use of all. Entertainments will be arranged for in the evenings, using local talent from the regiments and several addresses will be given by leading men from the cities of the Northwest. The same features were conducted two years ago and proved very popular among the men. The tents were well filled during the evenings and other times, when the men were not on duty. The general orders this year are very strict as to men leaving the camp, so the association tents will provide a good place for leisure hours. A cordial invitation is extended to all enlisted men and officers to make use of the features provided.
