

PROSPECTIVE RAILROAD IN EASTERN OREGON

(Prineville Journal.)
Coincident with the activity marking the promotion of the Central Oregon Railroad project, in which Prineville, Bend and Madras capital is primarily interested, comes authentic tidings of the intention on the part of the Herriman interests to extend the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad across the Cascade range from Albany and Detroit into the heart of Crook county and across the central area of the state clear to the Idaho line.

The survey for this transcontinental route was made a number of years ago, and right of way secured. Cut ties, rails and everything necessary for the construction of the proposed line has also been stored near Albany, on the west side of the mountains, for several years, so that the only thing needed to begin operations is the word to go ahead from the powers that be in Portland and New York. This seems now to have been given, and work bids fair to commence next spring.

For nearly a month now government engineers and woodsmen have been checking and measuring up the amount of timber standing on the right of way, and it is said by persons living in the Sisters country that no other timber than that on the Corvallis & Eastern has been cruised. The route of the railroad runs eastward from Detroit, the present terminal, across the main range north of the Three Sisters mountains to the town of Sisters thence southeast to a point one-half mile north of Laidlow, where the railroad will cross the Deschutes river on a cantilever bridge 125 feet high; thence in the same general direction just to the east of Bend, and on across the state through Burns and Vale to Ontario.

Led by Surveyor Robert Lea, who mapped the route for the Deschutes Valley line down that river to the Columbia, the party of civil engineers in the employ of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company of Bend, began work this week at O'Neill. They will survey northward to Madras, and then return to Bend, from which point they are to transit a feasible route through Redmond to O'Neill, and later the auxiliary line to Prineville. H. M. Gault and Frank May are in the surveying outfit.

DEPOT WANTED AT SPRINGFIELD JUNCTION

There is considerable complaint among the people residing at Springfield and in that vicinity because the Southern Pacific Company does not provide a depot or a waiting shed for that station. Every day one or more passengers board the local train there and during the time they are waiting for the arrival of the trains they are compelled to remain in the hot sun or in case of stormy weather they stand in the rain with absolutely no shelter. The company announced a year or so ago that it would build a good depot and keep an agent at the junction, and went so far as to buy land for that purpose, but for some reason or other no further action has been taken.

TRIAL OF MAE WOOD IN NEW YORK.

New York, Aug. 3.—The case of Mae C. Wood in New York, charged with forgery and perjury alleged to have been committed in her suit for divorce from United States Senator Thomas C. Platt, was on the calendar of the Court of General Sessions for hearing today, but by the consent of both sides, it is probable that the trial will go over until fall. Miss Wood has remained in seclusion since her release from the Tombs. Her counsel and friends declare that she will be vindicated when her case comes to trial and that there will be some sensational revelations.
