**EARLY MORNING FIRE DESTROYS SPRINGFIELD HOUSE**

The residence of Shan Collins, at the corner of Fifth and C streets in Springfield was destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The family arose early in order to take the excursion train for Newport. While they were preparing breakfast sparks from a defective kerosene lantern lit the woodwork surrounding it and soon the entire structure was in flames. The blaze was discovered about 4:30 o'clock. The alarm was given and the fire company responded quickly, but the house was four blocks away from the nearest hydrant and it took some time to lay a line of hose that long. When water was turned on the house was beyond saving. Some of the furniture from the lower floor was saved, but most of it was burned with the building. The residence was a two-story structure and was valued at about \$1,000. The insurance was \$300, carried in the Oregon Fire Relief Association.

**SAWMILLS BURN NEAR COTTAGE GROVE**

Cottage Grove, Aug. 1.—This morning about 2 o'clock McKibben Bros' sawmill, three miles east of this place, burned to the ground. The origin of the fire is not known. The lumber was saved by fluming it from the mill to the railroad siding, some distance away. The mill was valued at \$3,000. No insurance.

While the mill hands were at dinner the Wick sawmill on Row river 13 miles above this place caught fire last Saturday from an unknown cause and burned down. The loss is estimated at \$3,000, with no insurance.

**BRIEF NOTES OF THE DAY'S NEWS IN GENERAL.**

Helena, Mont., Aug. 3.—The second annual meeting of the Association of Postmasters at Montana began in this city today and will continue over tomorrow.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 3.—Delegates are arriving from all parts of the country to attend the national convention of the Knights of Columbus, which is to begin its sessions in this city tomorrow.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 3.—Favorable conditions attended the opening here today of the combination meeting of the Grand Circuit and the Great Western Circuit. The racing will continue until Saturday.

Troy, N. Y., Aug. 3.—Troy is entertaining for three days the annual State encampment of the United Spanish War Veterans. Several hundred delegates and visitors from various parts of the State are here for the gathering.

London, Aug. 3.—A large American delegation is to have a conspicuous part in the proceedings of the third international congress for the Advancement of Drawing and Art Education, which opened in London today for a five days' session.

Wallace, Idaho, Aug. 3.—A spirited contest for the gubernatorial nomination is anticipated by the delegates assembled here for the Democratic State nominating convention. The fight is between the Dubois and anti-Dubois factions and the issues revolve about the question of continuing the fight against the Mormons, which, under Dubois' control, has been vigorously waged for the past four years.

Kirksville, Mo., Aug. 3.—Three thousand practitioners of the school of osteopathy have assembled here for their twelfth annual convention, which will be in session until the end of the week. Saturday will be devoted to the celebration of the eightieth anniversary of the birth of Dr. A. T. Still, to whom is given the credit for the discovery of the science of Osteopathy.

Asbury Park, N. J., Aug. 3.—Two hundred leaders of the Reformed Church of America are here for the eighteenth assembly of pastors and laymen of that denomination. The proceedings open tonight with a sermon by the Rev. Dr. David J. Burrill of New York. The deliberations of the assembly will consume most of the week and during that time there will be sermons and addresses by a number of noted divines.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 3.—A five days' harness meeting which opened today at the old Fair Grounds track probably will be the last horse race meeting of any description to be held on that historical course, which is soon to be up for building lots. These meetings, the Missouri law to that effect being strictly enforced.

Madrid, Aug. 3.—The present week will witness a series of yacht races in Spanish waters in celebration of the 415 anniversary of the departure of Christopher Columbus on the voyage which resulted in the discovery of a new world. The course selected for the contests is from Puerto Palos, whence Columbus took his departure, to Teneriffe in the Canary Islands, covering over 700 miles of the first part of Columbus voyage.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 3.—Members of the Michigan National Guard are assembling to take part in what promises to be the biggest rifle competition in the history of the military organization in that state. The contests will begin tomorrow and continue four days. They will include competitions for all branches of the service and will be participated in by several hundred officers and men. The team matches will be participated in by representatives of the First, Second, and Third regiments and of the Naval brigade. The principal event will be the competition for places on the Michigan team, who will compete in the national matches at Camp Perry.

**PYTHIAN KNIGHTS GATHER IN THE CITY OF BOSTON**

Boston, Mass., Aug. 3.—The work of the twenty-fifth biennial convention and encampment of the Knights of Pythias began in this city today with an attendance that gives promise of surpassing any previous similar event in the history of the order. The headquarters of the convention were opened today at the Hotel Somerset, where all business sessions are to be held.

Elaborate arrangements have been made by the citizens of Boston for the entertainment of the Pythians. Thousands of dollars have been raised by popular subscription. The camp of the uniform rank was opened today at Franklin field, and here Major-General Arthur J. Stoddard, of St. Paul, will review the troops. The camp was formally dedicated this afternoon with a flag-raising ceremony followed by brief addresses by Governor Guild, Mayor Hibbard, Supreme Chancellor Charles A. Barnes, of Jacksonville, Ill., and Major-General Stoddard, commanding the uniform rank.

Two huge parades, a feature unprecedented in similar gatherings of other fraternal orders, which have had but a single parade, will add interest to the events of the week. The parade of the uniform rank will take place tomorrow afternoon, and it is estimated that there will be 15,000 Knights and 50 bands of music in line. On Wednesday the subordinate lodges, with 18,000 in line, will parade under command of Chief Marshal Lieutenant George E. Wragg. The governor and other dignitaries will review the parade from a stand erected on Boston Common. The thoroughfares through which the parades will pass, including Beacon, Boylston, Summer and Tremont streets, are tastefully decorated for the occasion.

Nearly fifty companies, representing a score of states, are entered in the competitive drills, for which cash prizes aggregating \$10,000 have been hung up. The drills will take place at Franklin Field Thursday and Friday.

Charles A. Barnes, of Illinois, will preside over the conference of the supreme lodge. He will be succeeded in the chair of supreme chancellor by Henry P. Browne, of Cleburne, Tex., the present supreme vice chancellor, it being the custom to make the vice chancellor the next chancellor. The real contest of the convention will centre upon the election of the next supreme vice-chancellor. Several states have candidates for the office. Massachusetts is pushing vigorously the candidacy of Dr. Dwight Sidney Woodworth, of Fitchburg. Major-General Stoddard, of Minnesota, probably will be re-elected commander of the uniform rank.

Among the visitors to the city are thousands of members of the Pythian Slates, the woman's auxiliary of the order, in whose honor many special features of entertainment have been arranged. Two grand balls, several receptions, a banquet and excursion to Nantasket and other points of interest are included in the program prepared for the next ten days.

**SUNDAY CLOSING LAW AT ROSEBURG**

Roseburg, Or., Aug. 1.—It is likely now that the matter of the Sunday closing laws in Roseburg will be thoroughly reviewed in the circuit court. In Justice Long's court last evening R. B. Mathews, who conducts a soft drink parlor, and C. J. Denning, who has a cigar store, both pleaded guilty to being open on Sunday, July 19, and withdrew their former pleas of not guilty. Upon the defendants agreeing to keep closed Sundays until a higher court could determine upon the constitutionality of the law, the justice imposed the minimum fine, \$5, in each case.

It is quite likely that before tonight Rhoades, in whose case the jury disagreed, and Jennings, another man arrested for keeping his place open on Sunday, will plead guilty, and later the cases will be taken through the circuit court.
