## HISTORIC FLEET IN BOSTON HARBOR

Boston, Mass., Aug. 3.—A naval squadron composed of ships that have been of world-wide fame in three great naval wars of the United States are representing four distinct types of naval architecture, in their achievement epitomizing the entire naval history of the nation will be in Boston harbor during the whole of this week.

The ships are the historic frigates Constitution, "Old Ironsides," permanently located at the Charlestown navy yard; Farragut's flagship, the Hartford, which led in the American navy when she ran the batteries below New Orleans and at Mobile; the cruiser Chicago, the flagship of the first "white squadron" of the new navy; the cruiser Olympia, which was the flagship of Admiral Dewey in the battle of Manila Bay; the cruiser New York, the flagship of Admiral Sampson at Santiago, and the monitors Arkansas and Nevada, excellent types of the grim little fighters which conquered the dread Merrimac, and which are still considered capable of doing good service as coast defense ships.

## THIRTY-EIGHT YEARS BEHIND PRISON WALLS

Boston, Mass., Aug. 3.—Possibly the only man in the world without a friend outside of prison walls is William E. Hill, a civil war veteran, who today entered upon his thirty-ninth year as an inmate of the state prison in Charlestown. Hill is serving a life sentence for the murder of William Jacobs, near Stoughton Centre, in 1870. His friends deserted him from the first, and his wife, who aided him in the commission of the crime and then turned state's evidence at the trial, long since disappeared. Hill was first sentenced to be hanged, but this sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment by Governor Claflin. He entered prison August 3, 1870. Since then he has been outside the prison walls only twice—once when the prison was transferred to Concord, and again, a few years later, when it was transferred back to Charlestown. Although he has spent the best years of his life behind the bars and is now an old man, he has never lost hope of some day being pardoned.

## ENORMOUS INCREASE TO GLASS WORKERS.

Cleveland, Aug. 1.—Coincident with the announcement of an increase in the price of window glass, the American Window Glass Company, through President Faulkner, the newly re-elected head of the window glass workers, declared that an enormous increase in wages would be received by the union men in the making of a new wage agreement next month. The American company announced an increase of 20 per cent on single strength glass, and 33 1/2 on double strength glass, to go into effect at once. Mr. Faulkner says this means an increase of 40 per cent in wages for single strength workmen and 66 2/3 per cent for double strength. A new wage agreement is to be made on September 1.

## CRESWELL, GARDEN SPOT OF LANE COUNTY

(Special Correspondence)  
Creswell, Aug. 3.—One of the garden spots in Lane county is the beauty, pretty homes, prosperous farms and thriving orchards. A visit to Creswell just now is worth the while of the most pessimistic creature in the county. If it does not send him home with better thoughts buzzing through his bonnet it will be strange indeed. This favored section of Lane county is developing with a steady growth, which spells prosperity and permanency with large, black capital centers. There is no boom on down in this section, but the progress being made in the town and surrounding country is surprising to say the least. Strangers are dropping in here all the time from the East, California and other sections of Oregon. The day of large farms is past, and many are looking for smaller homes and the donation claims are being cut up. Where there now is one family there will be a dozen in a few years. Creswell will get the trade and will be a town of 2,000 inhabitants in a few years. Some twenty buildings have been put up since spring, and a number of fine residences will be put up this fall. A three-story hotel is now being built.

One has no idea of the beauties of the country until a visit is paid to Creswell. Passing through there on the railroad train gives but little idea of the surrounding country because so little of it can be seen from the window of a car. The trip must be made with a vehicle, well-trained lively horses. The roads are fine and a person can spend several days driving around and not begin to see all the fine country.

The richest of the Eastern lands are to be found here, and anything that will grow in the East will grow in the Willamette valley, besides all kinds of fruit except tropical, with a California climate thrown in for good measure, and the very best of land so cheap that we dare not mention the price or our readers will think that only say so and see for yourself. Then you will become as enthusiastic as the writer of this, who has lived in California since 1894, and been all over Oregon and Washington.

The climate and soil are just right to make the very best of fruit, and whether fruit-growing pays ask Dr. Scarborough, who will have about 200 tons of dried fruit this fall, and there are several others who have smaller orchards. That they are convinced is proven by the fact that they are constantly increasing the acreage in fruit. It will not be many years before this part of the Willamette valley will make Hood River valley, Ashland, Medford and the other thousand-dollar-an-acre fruit sections look to their laurels.

The land of opportunity today is Oregon. The Willamette valley is the cream of Oregon. Creswell is in the heart of the Willamette valley. A few acres of land there properly tilled will make any man independent for life. There is practically no limit to the variety of crops that can be raised in this valley.
