STUBBORN FIGHT IN SUNFLOWER STATE CLOSES

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 1.—The campaign for the republican gubernatorial nomination between R. R. Starns and Cyrus Leland closed last night in a whirlwind finish and today the primary is being held throughout the state. The campaign has been one of the most partisan in the history of the Commonwealth and has attracted wide attention. Mr. Leland claims that he will carry the state by a large majority, while Mr. Starns is equally confident. The choice of a successor to Chester L. Long in the United States senate is also involved in the result of the primary and fully as much interest is manifested in this contest as in the fight for the nomination for governor. Senator Long is a candidate for re-election and is opposed by Joseph L. Bristow, who was formerly fourth assistant Postmaster general. Candidates for minor places on the state ticket and for county offices are also selected at the primary. Advances from various parts of the state received early in the day indicate that an unusually large vote will be polled.

Primary in Oklahoma.

Guthrie, Okla., Aug. 4.—A general primary for the nomination of candidates for state offices and members of the legislature is being held throughout Oklahoma today. Tickets have been placed in the field by the democratic, the republican and the socialist parties.

PYTHIAN KNIGHTS PARADE IN BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Aug. 4.—The Knights of Pythias national convocation was in full swing today, proceeding simultaneously in several departments. These included the encampment of the uniform rank, the opening session of the supreme lodge and the opening exercises of the several auxiliary bodies.

The welcoming exercises took place at the Somerset Hotel this morning, with addresses of greeting by Dr. D. S. Woodworth, supreme representative of Massachusetts; George W. Pennington, grand chancellor of Massachusetts; Governor Guild and Mayor Hibbard, with response by Supreme Chancellor Barnes of Illinois.

The afternoon was given over to the general parade of the uniform rank. Several thousand visitors came into the city to watch the Pythians march. Some 10,000 members of the order, representing many states, were in line, under the command of St. Paul. The line of march was elaborately decorated and the sidewalks, windows and stands were crowded with spectators who heartily applauded the many attractive features of the parade.
