DEFENDANT IN FAMOUS CRIMINAL CASE IS DEAD

Denver, August 2.—George A. Pettibone, for years prominent in the councils of the Western Federation of Miners and charged with President Moyer and ex-Secretary W. D. Haywood with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Stuenkel, died at St. Joseph's hospital tonight from the effects of an operation for cancer.

Pettibone has been ill practically ever since his confinement in the Idaho penitentiary, which began more than a year previous to the fa-

mony trials at Boise. Pettibone was tried and acquitted. He leaves a widow.

Pettibone was involved in the Stuenkel case by Harry Orchard, the confessed assassin, and by the letters and telegrams received signed "Pat Bone" and by remittances of money. Orchard's story was that Pettibone who, though not a member of the Miners' Federation, was a warm adherent and confidential adviser of its officers, was the medium through which he was kept supplied with funds when he was in San Francisco planning the murder of Bradley, and in Caldwell, preparing to blow up Stuenkel. Orchard said that some of his bombs were prepared in Pettibone's backyard.
