**AUKLAND IS PREPARING FOR ATLANTIC FLEET**

Auckland, Aug. 5.—New Zealand is putting the finishing touches to the preparations for the entertainment of the American battleship fleet and is awaiting the arrival of the ships at the end of this week with the greatest interest. The city will be decorated in honor of the occasion and doubtless will be thronged with visitors from all parts of the country.

The fleet is to remain here four days and during that time there will be an almost continuous sound of festivities. By general consent the day of arrival will be made a semi-holiday in Auckland. The federal officials and the mayors and other representatives of the chief cities of New Zealand will be here to participate in the welcome. The official welcome by the governor-general, Lord Plunket, will be made a separate event. In addition to the dinners, receptions and other social functions to be held in this city there will be a number of excursions for the officers and men to points of interest, some of them a hundred miles and more distant from Auckland. A considerable part of the four days' entertainment will consist of these trips.

The freedom of the city will be given the bluejackets of the fleet and many features are being arranged for their special entertainment. There will be baseball games, football, boxing and wrestling matches in addition to these there will be many forms of entertainment characteristic of the New Zealand aborigines.

**TORONTO WELCOMES COMING OF ROBERTS**

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 5.—An enthusiastic welcome awaits Lord Roberts upon his arrival in Toronto this evening. For the next two days the famous field marshal will be the guest of the city and the programme for his entertainment will take up nearly every moment of his time until his departure Saturday morning for Hamilton and Niagara Falls. Tomorrow he will be presented with a civic address of welcome. Other features of the programme will be a public reception in Queen's Park, and the conferring of an honorary degree upon him by Toronto University.

**FIVE PLUNGE TO DEATH IN AUTOMOBILE**

San Francisco, Aug. 3.—Coming down a steep grade in the hills west of Gurlingham at high speed, an automobile driven by Miss Ethel McCormack, and occupied by four other women and two children, all of San Mateo, suddenly swerved from the road as the result of the broken brakes and plunged straight down an embankment causing the death of three of the women and two children and injuring the other two. The victims of the disaster, the second of its kind near San Francisco within 48 hours were: Mrs. Thomas A. McCormack, her daughters, Miss Clara and Miss Ethel, Mrs. Ira G. O'Brien and the latter's two infant children, Miss E. G. McCauley, of San Francisco.

Of these seven Miss McCauley and Miss Ethel McCormack, the driver and the only two alive.

**WEALTHY MAN'S SUICIDE CAUSED BY APPARITION**

Rome, Aug. 5.—A strange story of haunting comes from Baronessi, a village near Salerno, where a rich young landowner has committed suicide, being driven to the act, so he stated in a letter, by the continual presence of an apparition.

It was one night last year that this haunting began, when the landowner Tommaso Giordano, who was only thirty years of age, returned home from a journey. As he approached the house, he was surprised, so he told his friends afterwards, to see it lit up and the door wide open.

Thinking thieves had broken in he aroused his servants, and directly he did so the lights went out. The house was searched, nobody was found in it, and nothing could be found amiss. St. Giordano went to bed thinking himself the victim of an illusion, but towards morning he was suddenly awakened.

Looking up he saw leaning over him an old woman dressed in black. This personage announced herself as a witch, and prophesied his violent death. Ever after then the landowner averred, he was continually persecuted by the witch, from whom in vain, he tried to escape.

He continued to attend to his affairs, but he always complained to his friends and servants that he could not get rid of the woman, who, since the first night of her appearance, always visited him day and night whenever he was alone.

Giordano as a last resort went to several doctors, who certified him as of sound mind, and told him to try to divert his attention. But the woman would sit near him in the train, and last week, he returned home, wrote letters to his friends, saying the witch had driven him to death, and then blew out his brains with a revolver.
