

ORDINANCES FOR TEN MORE BLOCKS OF PAVEMENT

City Attorney Bean is preparing ordinances for paving ten and a half more blocks of Eugene's streets, to be presented at the next meeting of the city council, which will be held Monday night, August 10. The ordinances call for the paving of West Eighth street from Charnelton to the west side of Monroe street, six blocks; West Ninth street, from Olive to Lincoln, two blocks; Sixth street, from Olive street to the alley between Willamette and Oak streets, a block and a half, and West Fifth street, from Olive to Willamette, one block. An effort will be made to pass all of these ordinances, although it is said there will be a fight on the one calling for the paving of West Eighth street. All spring and summer efforts have been made to get this measure through the council, but for one reason or another the ordinance failed to pass. However, those who have been working so diligently on the matter are sanguine of the success of their efforts this time.

WILL OPEN NEW STORE IN EUGENE

J. W. Heinzman, of Grand Rapids, Mich., after a few days' stay in Eugene, went to Portland today and from there will leave in a short time for his home. He was very much impressed with Eugene as a place for business and he has expressed his intention of returning within a few months and opening a bazaar here. He would like to start in business here at once, but there are no buildings available for him. He conferred with a number of capitalists in regard to erecting a suitable building and partial arrangements were made to that effect. Further announcements will be made later concerning the matter.

Reed, his companions, are wounded; while Dan Carr, the complaining witness, received five wounds late this evening in a gunfight at the Carr homestead, seven miles from Oro Fino, on the Pierce City road. ANDERSON AND BERGER FALL OVER STEEP PRECIPICE

WAGON TIPPED OVER WITH THEM AND TWO OF OCCUPANTS SUFFERED BROKEN LIMBS—WERE ON WAY TO HILL'S RANCH ON HUNTING AND FISHING TRIP

EUGENE MAN BADLY HURT NEAR CORVALLIS

The Corvallis Times of yesterday tells of an accident to a Eugene man as follows:

"Yesterday evening a camper, with his family, enroute from Newport to Eugene, was thrown from a horse near the bridge in South Main street. The gentleman is past 60 years and suffered a badly crushed hip, which was attended by a couple of local physicians, who report that the old man will not be able to move for ten weeks, and will never again walk easily."

FIRST 1908 WHEAT IS COMING IN

Washburne & Son, the Springfield millers, telephoned The Guard this afternoon that they received the first 1908 wheat this morning, several loads coming in. The wheat is of excellent quality, full weight, and that which has been brought in averaged 20 bushels to the acre. Threshing will be general throughout the county this week, a number of outfits having started up last week. The hot weather of the past two or three weeks has ripened the grain very rapidly, and threshing began on that account a little earlier than usual.

LAD STREET CAR TRACK AT ALBANY AS A JOKE

It looked like business this morning when the Democrat man came down town a little after 6 o'clock, says yesterday's Albany Democrat. Along the middle of Second street some of the ties—to be exact, fifteen—had been laid during the night, with four rails covering them, making a short street car track on the line of the proposed Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Company. For a long time these ties have been piled along Second street, and the rails laid close to the sidewalk, amid the growing grass. Some boys evidently thought it would be a good object lesson to put the ties and rails in use, and so did some very heavy work, which it took a good force of men to get out of the way for street travel. It is suggestive, all the same, and the owners of the line should be made to show their hand.

Later—Bert Wyatt officiated as master of ceremonies in replacing the ties and rails, by direction of the Willamette Valley Company, and the street is clear this evening.

FOUR MORE LAND FRAUD INDICTMENTS DISMISSED

Four additional indictments were dismissed late yesterday afternoon by Judge Wolverton at the request of T. C. Becker, special assistant attorney-general. This was indictment No. 4848, known as the "Los Angeles case," and involved the officers of the Pacific Lumber & Furniture Co. Those against whom the indictments were dismissed were Warren Gibson, George L. Stearns, Robert W. Kenney and Jacob C. Gross. The company officials and their agents were indicted on a charge of trying to defraud the government of 9000 acres in Curry county.—Telegram.
