DRUMMERS TO WAR ON CUSTOM OF TIPPING

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 6.—The waiter, the porter, the bellboy with the itching palm must go. The tipping custom must be abolished. This is the edict of the traveling men of the country assembled in Milwaukee today to complete the organization of the National Travelers' association. The proposed organization is to serve as a clearing-house for all complaints from commercial travelers. The tipping bill heads the list of grievances and is to be given first attention. When that problem has been solved the association will work to secure clean towels, six-foot sheets, adequate fire escapes and other things which the drummers believe themselves entitled to but which they do not always receive at the hands of the hotel proprietors.

The present meeting will be in session during the remainder of this week. Before it adjourns it is expected that the national organization will be given a good start and within a few months it is hoped to have a membership of not less than 50,000. The association will take in members of both of the national organizations of traveling men now existing.

The association will aim to bring about the desired reforms through the medium of the law. Committees will be appointed to go before the legislatures of the different states to come winter and speak in support of measures to do away with the tipping system and discrimination in hotel rates against the traveling salesmen.

MEDICAL CONGRESS MEETS AT GAUTEMALA

Guatemala City, Aug. 6.—With an attendance representing nearly all the countries from Canada to Argentina, the Pan-American Medical Congress has assembled here for what promises to be the most notable session held since its organization five years ago. The United States and Mexico are particularly well represented at the gathering. Both the army and navy of the United States are represented by prominent members of their medical departments, and the American Medical Association and several other organizations of physicians, surgeons and public health officers have sent delegates. The proceedings of the congress will occupy a week, and will include papers and discussions covering a wide range of topics relating to the public health and the practice of medicine. The treatment and prevention of tuberculosis will be exhaustively discussed. Sanitation, the prevention of the spread of contagious diseases, the medical services in the army and navy and the best methods of compiling vital statistics are among other matters that will receive attention. The government of Guatemala has made ample provision for the entertainment and accommodation of the delegates to the congress during their stay in the capital.

M. C. A. rooms. It was decided at the last state convention of Christian churches, closing July 5 at Turner, that Portland was the place for the permanent headquarters of the board.

The executive committee will meet Monday and the full board will meet quarterly. The executive committee is composed of Rev. Davis Errett, of Salem, president of the board; Rev. J. J. Evans, of Albany, first vice president; Rev. C. F. Swander, of McMinnville, corresponding secretary; Rev. Geo. C. Ritchey, of Newberg, recording secretary, and Alvin S. Hawk, of Portland, treasurer. Rev. J. J. Evans was not present yesterday.

W. M. CAKE HONORED BY KNIGHTS OF PYTHIAS

Boston, Mass., Aug. 5.—W. M. Cake, of Portland, was honored by the Knights of Pythias' convention in this city with an appointment on the standing committee on judiciary, announced today. M. F. Davis, past grand chancellor of Oregon, was raised to the supreme lodge rank at today's business session. The section of the camp allotted to the visitors from the Pacific slope has but few Oregon occupants, mainly, as in the case of Seattle, because of the failure of the railroads to give attractive rates.

NEW YORK YACHT CLUB IN ANNUAL CRUISE

New London, Conn., Aug. 6.—"Some of the finest and fastest racing yachts in their respective classes in the United States and many big fast steam yachts gathered in this harbor today to participate in the annual cruise of the New York Yacht Club to Newport and Marblehead, which is scheduled to start tomorrow morning. The cruise this year is planned to occupy eight days, during which time there will be the usual squadron runs from port to port for the usual trophies.

Saturday, Sunday and Monday will be spent at Newport. On Saturday the Astor Cup races will be sailed. Sunday will be the customary day of rest and recreation. On Monday the race for the King's cup will be sailed off Newport. This contest is for a handsome trophy presented to the club by King Edward.

The fleet will leave Newport on Tuesday morning bound for Vineyard Haven, a course of thirty-seven miles. The longest run of the cruise will be on Wednesday from Vineyard Haven to Provincetown, a distance of eighty-two miles. The last run of the cruise will be held on the following day, from Provincetown to Marblehead, forty-one miles. Friday will be spent quietly in the little Marblehead harbor, which will give the yachtsmen a day of rest before the joint regatta of the Eastern and New York Yacht clubs on Saturday. The chief prize in the joint regatta will be the Commodore's cups, presented by Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt of the New York Yacht Club. The New York fleet will disband on Sunday, many of the yachts to continue to cruise farther to the eastward.
