### JAPS REPLACE MACHINIST STRIKERS ON C. P. LINES

Winnipeg, Aug. 5.—The Canadian Pacific is now replacing some of the strikers in the Western shops by Japanese, and the crux of the situation lies in the attitude of the engineers, firemen and conductors. The indications are that within a few days they will refuse to take out trains on the ground that they have not been properly instructed. This action would result in a complete tie-up of the entire system.

### BRITISH CONSUL'S TERRITORY EXTENDED

Portland, Aug. 6.—The territory of Alaska has been added to the jurisdiction of British Consul James Laidlaw, and Colonel L. R. Steward has been appointed vice consul, with headquarters at Nome. Mr. Laidlaw has under consideration the appointment of vice consuls for Marshfield, Oregon, and Aberdeen, Washington.

### HOP YARDS MAY GO UNPICKED

Sacramento, Aug. 5.—There is a rumor to the effect that the hop growers and dealers in this and Yolo county will hold a meeting in this city in a few days to take drastic action to steady the hop market from existing over-production. The movement is said to contemplate bringing the growers and dealers of the entire coast into line with a view of letting a portion of this year's crop, possibly 20 to 25 per cent, go unpicked. It is understood that after the Mendocino county growers have been approached, then those of Oregon and Washington will be visited.
