PYTHIAN CONGLOAVE IS NEARING END

Hood River, Aug. 7.—The official program of the Pythian of the Hood River lodge is an affair today with the breaking up of the camp at Franklin Park, a large number of the delegates and visitors in attendance have arranged to remain in Hood River and vicinity during a part of the coming week. For their benefit features of entertainment have been added to the program in the shape of several social functions and a number of trips to places of historic interest in and about Hood River. Special religious services for the visiting knights will be held tomorrow in the Union Congregational Church. Rev. Allen E. Stockdale, grand prelate of the order and pastor of the church, will preach a sermon, taking as his subject, "Dominant Notes in Pythianism."

LAND GRANT BILL GOES TO BONAPARTE.

The bill in equity which is to be filed against the Oregon & California Railroad Company by the government officials in the famous land grant case is to be started on its way to Washington, D. C., this afternoon, where it goes to be approved by Attorney-General Charles J. Bonaparte and receive his signature. The narrative part of the bill covers 68 printed pages and the exhibits amount to about 300 pages, making the bill one of the largest ever compiled on the Pacific coast. Approximately there are 75,000 words in the bill. The bill was mailed to the attorney general by B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the attorney-general, who has been at work gathering evidence and presenting the facts before congress for more than a year. It is expected that the bill will be returned to Portland within the next two weeks, when it will be filed in the United States court.—Oregon Journal.
