

## ADIAN PACIFIC FILLS SHOP WITH NON-UNION MEN

Aug. 8.—Fifty more men were taken to the Canadian shops here today, and the perfected arrangement for sending 1000 men in its outfit of the road are unskilled men seeking employment. The men are not the kind wanted by the British machine-makers, who are expected to be placed on the line next week. All the men are taken into the night. The opinion of the company is that the strike is broken, and it is said that it is not anxious to give any man who has been taken to the shops. The men who have been taken to the shops are in bad condition, and it is necessary to have auxiliary locomotives, and in one case an express train had to drop one car because the engine power was insufficient.

## SPOKANE WANTS FOOTRACE BETWEEN WORLD CHAMPIONS

Spokane, Aug. 8.—A \$2500 trophy cup is offered by the Spokane Chamber of Commerce for a 400-meter footrace between Lieut. Halsewell, of the British army, and J. G. Carpenter, of Cornell, to take place at the Interstate fair here on October 5. Halsewell was the winner of the Olympic event at London after Carpenter had been barred from the race for an alleged foul. The Chamber of Commerce offers the men transportation to and from here.

## FIELD WORK FOR WATER LINE COMPLETED TODAY

The field work of the survey for the gravity line of the Eugene water works was finished today by McClain and McArthur, the local surveying firm. Specifications will be ready for contracts in a few weeks with full drawings. Grover Kestley and Olen Arnsperger, who have been assisting the engineers, returned last night from the crew.

## OPERA EXTENSION PROMOTERS MEET AT CARLEBAD

Carlebad, Austria, Aug. 8.—Messrs. Gatti-Casazza, Dippol and Kahn met in conference this morning to discuss measures for increasing the scope and influence of the Metropolitan Opera Company, of New York City in fostering the operatic art and culture. A plan was adopted for making the Metropolitan the centre of a national movement for extending opera throughout the United States. The plan is modeled after the university extension idea. One general object is to create a universal interest in operatic chorus singing.

Hitherto in the United States chorus effort has confined itself exclusively to oratorio. Now an organized effort is to be effected in inviting general attention to the beauties and delights of operatic singing. Local musical societies are to be induced to study operas suggested by an advisory council composed of competent authorities. Preparations for the performance of an opera may be carried as far as local talent and enthusiasm will permit. As far as possible the Metropolitan Opera Company will, whenever requested, lend its co-operation by sending efficient soloists and furnishing whatever else may be requisite to enable a satisfactory performance.

## GREAT FLOUR MILLS CONCERN IN HANDS OF RECEIVERS

BUSINESS IS PROFITABLE AND WILL CONTINUE WITHOUT INTERRUPTION—RECEIVERSHIP IS SAID TO BE MERELY INCIDENT TO REORGANIZATION OF CORPORATION

Minneapolis, Aug. 8.—Incident to re-organization, certain stockholders in the Pillsbury-Washburn Flour Mills Company today petitioned the federal court for the appointment of a receiver. The petition was granted and the court named C. S. Pillsbury, son of the late C. A. Pillsbury; A. C. Loring, head of the Northwest Consolidated Milling Company, and A. C. Cobb, an attorney.

The petitioners were the Northwestern National Bank, the First National Bank, the Swedish-American National Bank, of Minneapolis, and the Second National Bank, of St. Paul, together with J. S. Pillsbury. There will be no interruption of the business of the company.

## Business Is Profitable

Chicago, Aug. 8.—The capitalization of the Pillsbury-Washburn mills is \$5,000,000, divided equally between common and preferred stock. Outstanding bonds, according to a statement of the company, issued four months ago, amounted to \$4,150,000. The net earnings were \$642,000, against which were interest charges of \$250,000, dividend on preferred stock of \$177,000, and other charges amounting to \$200,000, leaving a balance of \$15,000.

## 'DAISY' WALLIS BUYS THE REED MANSION

SECURES BEAUTIFUL RESIDENCE ON EAST ELEVENTH STREET—J. V. REED BUYS FARM FROM WALLIS

Lee ("Daisy") Wallis, of this city, has purchased J. V. Reed's splendid residence on East Eleventh street, formerly the Park residence, for \$13,500, the deed having been passed yesterday. In exchange Mr. Reed secures the Wallis farm of 141.11 acres in section 34, township 17, south of range 4 west, the consideration given in the deed being \$14,111.

Mr. Wallis will probably not live in the residence he has just purchased, as he is a single man, but may lease it to some one. One of his sisters has talked of coming to Eugene to reside, and it may be that she will occupy the house.

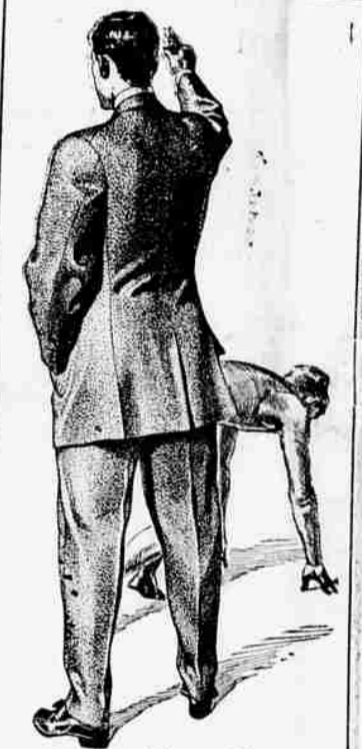

## DEAD BELLERS IN TROUBLE AT ROSHBURG

Charged with cruelty to an animal, Mike and Sam Shaman, itinerant card players, were placed on trial in Judge Lusk's court this afternoon at 2 o'clock, with Frank G. Micoll acting as their attorney, says the Roshburg Review. The defendants drove into town Tuesday with the most pitiful looking horse imaginable. The animal was almost a skeleton from starvation and overwork, and its body was half raw with sores. It was also covered with a disease-breeding filth. Marshal Norman took the poor beast to Sam Smith's livery, where, under proper care, it is improving both in looks and strength. The defendants themselves are half-starved in appearance and equally as dirty-looking as was their miserable horse. They claim the animal is diseased, but if this fact it is easily accounted for. The penalty for their offense is a fine of from \$5 to \$50, and unfortunately without a jail sentence.

## GENERAL NEWS IN BREWERY FORM

Gratts Pass is surrounded by fire on every side, which started on the Chausse place near the city limits. Men are fighting day and night to save buildings on the outlying sections of the city, so far successfully.

A Stockton (Cal.) dispatch says: Fanned by a strong wind, the fire which is causing the ranchers and cattlemen of Tuolumne and Calaveras counties a lot of trouble, swept over a large area and consumed a lot of pasture along with a number of buildings and fences. It started along the south fork of the Stanislaus river and swept across a wide strip of country northward near Greenland.

Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, has filed a petition in involuntary bankruptcy at Pittsburg, and Roger O'Mara, a well-known detective has been appointed receiver for his estate. Thaw's schedule shows \$128,912.28 assets and \$453,140.43 liabilities. Of this latter amount \$79,745.22 is secured. It is supposed this action was taken in order to escape payment of exorbitantly large claims of lawyers and others incurred during the murder trial.
