SOCIETIES OF CATHOLIC CHURCH MEET IN BOSTON

Boston, Mass., Aug. 8.—Five hundred prominent Catholic men and women, representing every State in the Union, have arrived in Boston to attend the Seventh National convention of the American Federation of Catholic Societies and Parishes. The Federation embraces the leading Catholic societies of the country and represents an aggregate membership of over 2,000 men and women.

The convention will open tomorrow with the celebration of Mass in the Cathedral of Holy Cross, when the solemnity of welcome to the delegates will be preached by Archbishop O'Connell. The business sessions will be held in Symphony Hall, beginning Monday and continuing three days.

Among the questions to be considered at the convention will be included such issues as divorce, Socialism, observance of the Lord's day, indecent advertisements and an indecent stage, Christian education, the missions, at home and abroad; the Catholic press and the spread of Catholic literature, improving the condition of immigrants and approving the enactment of laws to prohibit child labor.

The convention will be presided over by National President Feeney of Brooklyn. Lieutenant Governor Draper and Mayor Hibbard will welcome the visitors. Other prominent speakers to be heard at the several sessions are Bishop McFaul of Trenton, Thomas H. Cannon of Chicago, and F. W. Neekamp of Quincy, Ill.

The visitors registering at convention headquarters today included delegates from Cincinnati, Chicago, Brooklyn, Buffalo, New Orleans, Milwaukee, Philadelphia, Erie, Baltimore, Minneapolis, Topeka, Dubuque, Detroit and a number of other cities.

ARCHITECT HENSILL DRAWS LIBRARY PLANS.

Y. D. Hensill of Eugene, Oregon, was in Chehalis last Thursday consulting with the local commission of the Carnegie library that is to be built here this fall. Mr. Hensill is an architect of widespread reputation and it was from his plans that the Carnegie library at Eugene, and the library at the University of Oregon were built. He will submit plans to the commission for the Chehalis library, which will probably be ready along the same lines as those from which the Eugene library was built, and as soon as the plans are received, in ten days or two weeks, and gone over by the local commission, they will be submitted to the Carnegie people for their approval.

While here Mr. Hensill looked over the park ground where the library is to be erected and was well pleased with the site. As soon as the plans are passed on by the Carnegie people work will commence and be pushed forward as rapidly as possible before the rainy season sets in.—Chehalis (Wash.) Advocate.

STATE'S GIFT TO NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 8.—With interesting ceremonies on board the battleship today, Governor Charles M. Floyd and a delegation of prominent citizens of the state presented to the officers of the war ship a magnificent service of solid silver. The gifts were received by Captain Newberry and his officers. The silver service, comprising more than a dozen pieces and valued at several thousand dollars, was spread on an improvised table on the quarter deck, where it could be viewed by the officers and men of the ship.

CORONATION ANNIVERSARY OF POPE PIUS.

Rome, Aug. 8.—The sixth anniversary of the coronation of Pope Pius X will be celebrated tomorrow in the Sixtine chapel with deep religious solemnity and great pomp. The event will be attended by all the cardinals, the papal court, the diplomatic corps accredited to the Vatican, the heads of the religious orders and hundreds of pilgrims now in Rome from America and other parts of the world.

IT'S ALL BUT SUICIDE.

New Circus Thriller Escapes Death By Narrowest Margin.

"Autos that Pass in the Air" is the name under which the latest circus thriller is being exploited. It is the hair-raising feature this season with the Barnum & Bailey Greatest Show on Earth. In the point of danger involved and for downright rashness, it certainly has no antecedent. As to the thrill-giving powers it stands alone.

The act is just what its name implies—the passing of two automobiles in mid-air, or to be more explicit, the encircling of one car by the other after the two have been projected from a steep incline and are leaping a gap to a ground platform. As usual the act is exploited by women—mere girls, as a matter of fact, for they are scarcely out of their teens.

"I would be afraid to trust a man with this act," says the inventor. "When there is something the stake men are brave; but it is only under stress of absolute necessity that they will risk their lives. When it comes to walking hand in hand with death for a stipulated sum per week, no matter how large the sum, there is no depending on the man. His nerve may fail him and he is likely to desert you at the last moment. Not so with a woman. At least this has been my experience.

The act requires four seconds. It seems more like an hour to the spectators, for into that brief moment are crowded all the intense excitement, worry and suspense that one can well withstand. The momentum is gained by a plunge down a narrow incline from the dome of the tent, one car behind the other. Close to the ground the track ends in a sharp upward curve which is the device that lifts the car up into space. The leading car arches gracefully across the gap, the other encircling it in a complete revolution. The machines land one behind the other, almost at the same instant and in reversed order.

The act is not a subject for word painting. There is no ink vivid enough to picture its terror. It is something to look at if one has the nerve, and not to read about.
