### COTTAGE GROVE FRUIT DRIER COMPLETED

The exterior of Cottage Grove's fine fruit drier building was completed this week when the painters put the last coat of paint on the building, including the roof, and it presents a very attractive and substantial appearance, says the Leader. The building is 40x80 feet and three stories high. Its furnace and evaporator will be 12x36 feet and this will be completed in time to receive the fall apple and prune crop for drying. A meeting of the stockholders is called for Thursday, August 20, to inspect the new building and outline the season's plan for receiving and drying and handling fruit. It is an enterprise which will be of great benefit to the town and community.

A cannery plant will be added to this drier plant later, provisions having been made for this addition when the building was built. The building and evaporator will cost about \$3500.

### RICH STRIKE AT SAMPSON CLAIM

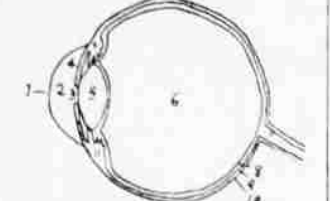

### THE EYE AND ITS CARE

- Of all the eye troubles crossed eyes is one of the most dreaded because it mars the appearance of the afflicted eye so seriously. Strabismus is caused by one of the six muscles of the eye being very weak and not able to hold its own against the other muscles. It occurs

where the eyes cross, the external muscle is at fault; thus allowing the eye to be pulled toward the nose by the internal rectus muscle. And where the eye turns out the internal rectus muscle is the weak one.

This is a trouble generally thought to be out of the range of the Refractionist Optician, but it is so only to a small extent. For the advancing knowledge of the eye it has been found that in young people, by means of certain exercises and special glasses that most cases of crossed eyes can be corrected without an operation. This has been especially successful with the children. I have seen, personally, many cases of crossed eyes become perfectly straight under this treatment. But in cases of many years standing a slight operation must be performed on the affected muscle by an Eye Surgeon.

**Cataract.**  
This subject is not really in the domain of the Refractionist and should always be referred to the surgeon. All competent Opticians and Refractionists should be able to diagnose diseases of the eye as well as the refractive errors. A Cataract is an affection of the crystalline lens. It loses its transparency and become opaque so that no light can pass through it to get to the retina, consequently the eye is blind, or nearly so. A cataract is not as is commonly supposed, something growing over the eye. This opacity may be very slow in forming and people having cataracts often are not aware of it until years after it first starts.

The development of cataracts varies in length of time, sometimes they mature in a short time, then again years may elapse before they reach maturity, which is necessary before an operation can be performed. The person with a cataract is more fortunate than many others for they know when the cataract is ripe it may be removed by the surgeon, and then the Refractionist will give them glasses, which, in most cases, will bring their vision back to normal.
