## GOOD ROADS

### NOW IN BOHEMIA

### MINING DISTRICT

**HERBERT LEIGH, MINING ENGINEER, RETURNS FROM FOUR WEEKS' STAY IN DISTRICT—AUTOMOBILES COULD EASILY REACH TOP OF MOUNTAIN.**

Herbert Leigh, the well-known mining engineer of this city, returned home Saturday night from the Bohemia mines, where he had been working for four weeks on the North Fairview property. He is enthusiastic over the present condition of the "Hardscrabble" road leading to the mines. Until recently the road has been rough and made traveling very disagreeable, but now, Mr. Leigh says, it is as good as any prairie road in the county. To prove this, he states that in coming out of the district he rode on horseback from the North Fairview mine to Wildwood, a distance of 1 1/2 miles, in three and a half hours, going in a trot or gallop all the way, whereas formerly this was impossible on account of the roughness of the road. All the stumps and big rocks have been removed the entire distance and the road leveled so that an automobile could easily make the trip to the top of the mountain.

**Much Work at Mayflower.**  
Mr. Leigh stated that the owners of the Mayflower mine are building a first-class road to their property, this being a continuation of the Noonday road. The Mayflower people are getting ready to install a reduction plant and they have recently developed a very large ledge of free milling ore. They are also constructing a big flume and an electric power plant.

There is greater activity in the district, Mr. Leigh says, than there has been for some time past, and he expects lively times there during the next few years. The mountains were never so beautiful as they are now, he says. Wild flowers abound in profusion and the grass is more prolific than he has ever seen it in the mountains.

### CARELESS SHOOTING AT JUDKINS' POINT

Yesterday afternoon about 10 o'clock some person or persons displayed lack of judgment by careless use of a gun at Judkins' Point. Two canoes were on the mill race opposite where the shooting occurred and one of the bullets struck the water not over three feet from one of the canoes, and right in the path of the other canoe. It was not a stray bullet, as the report seemed to come from just a few yards above.

It seems as though some effort should be made by the officers to apprehend and deal with these parties in such a manner that this will be altogether stopped. This is not the first occurrence of this kind, but it happens repeatedly. The authorities should not wait until some fatality occurs, but act now and prevent serious injury or the loss of life.

### DIED ON THE TRAIN NEAR COTTAGE GROVE

Roseburg, Aug. 8.—While enroute home from Newport, Mrs. Josephine Orth Wilkenson, a member of one of the best-known pioneer families of Jackson county, and wife of a well-known stockman at Klamath Falls, died early this morning on train No. 15, while near Cottage Grove. The funeral will be held Monday afternoon at Jacksonville.
