**UNION PRINTERS MEET IN ANNUAL SESSION AT BOSTON**

Boston, Mass., Aug. 10.—The fifty-fourth convention of the International Typographical Union opened in Ford Memorial Hall today with an attendance of nearly 2,000 delegates and visitors from all parts of the United States and Canada. Addresses of welcome were made by Mayor Hibbard, the officers of the Boston union and others, and were responded to by President James M. Lynch. The reports of officers were then presented to the convention.

The report of President Lynch is a comprehensive document, and covers the progress made by the international organization for the period elapsing since the Hot Springs convention of last year and recommends numerous plans for the future. In referring to the work of the year, Mr. Lynch stated that it was largely along lines of effort at reclamation of those offices that were lost, temporarily at least, during the eight-hour campaign. On this subject the report said: "The membership today is but a trifle less than at the time the eight-hour difficulty occurred, when it was about 47,000. Today the membership is about 46,000. The reclamation work referred to will continue during the coming year."

Secretary-Treasurer J. W. Bramwood, in his report, showed total receipts of \$774,953.24 for the year ending May 31, 1908, and expenditures of \$832,799.96 for the same period. Under the head of burial fund, \$38,650 was paid during the year, and under the head of defense fund, including transfer to other funds, \$661,798.32 was paid out. For the year, the average membership, as indicated by the per capita tax payments, was 43,740, an increase of 1,383 over the average membership of 11907.

The convention will remain in session until the end of the week. At various sessions there will be addresses by labor leaders and others of national prominence, including among those present are representatives from the American Newspaper Publishers' Association, with which the International Typographical Union holds a special arbitration agreement, running until 1912, which guarantees both sides against strikes or lock-outs, and provides that any disagreement must be settled by arbitration.

The selection of the place for next year's convention is eagerly sought by Seattle, Wn., and St. Joseph, Mo., and boomers from both cities were on hand at the opening today, working to secure the convention.

One of the features of the convention in which the public is especially interested is the attitude which the International Typographical Union may assume in regard to the movement inaugurated by President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, seeking to secure the united support of organized labor for William J. Bryan for the Presidency. While the officers of the typographical union have declined to state publicly the stand they will take in regard to the matter it is pretty well understood that the organization, in accordance with its past reputation for conservatism, will avoid committing itself definitely to any political programme.



The performance was greeted with a burst of cheers from a small number of people invited to view the experiment. Wright was warmly congratulated by all the experts, who seized the flight a wonderful exhibition of aviation.

**All Doubters Silenced**

The successful flight made by Wilbur Wright with his aeroplane today puts an end to a long, anxious wait in America and Europe to see what the Wright brothers were capable of doing. In Europe the "mysterious Wrights" have been an absorbing problem for aviation enthusiasts, and they have interested the representatives of the various governments.

The long postponement of a public exhibition of what the Americans had to show the world aroused the liveliest comment and from some quarters of skepticism, a Paris newspaper only last night referring to the "Bluff Wright Brothers," of whom everybody has been talking for many years, but who, as yet, "have not made good."

Weather conditions for the first test were splendid. The sky was blue and without a cloud, and a gentle northwest wind was blowing.

**Soores Upward Like a Bird**

**WRIGHT'S NEW AEROPLANE FLIES LIKE A BIRD**

Lemans, France, Aug. 8.—Wilbur Wright, of Dayton, Ohio, made a flight computed at 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 kilometres (2.17 miles) with his aeroplane here this morning. The official time of the flight was 1:46. Throughout the flight Mr. Wright had perfect control of the machine.

No attempt was made for a distance record, the only object of the flight being to try out the aeroplane while flying through the air Wright demonstrated, or so it appeared to the spectators, that he was absolute master of the airship, first soaring and then shooting downward and



then mounting at will, until finally, after completing the two circles, he came down easily to earth.

The descent was sure and easy, and was carried out with great nicety, without causing a shock to either the machine or occupants.

Estimates vary as to the distance covered by the aeroplane, but the average was three kilometres, about 1.8 miles. Hart O. Berg, European representative of the Wright Brothers, gave the official time as 1:46.
