GREAT ACTIVITY ON WEST EIGHTH STREET

MANY OLD WOODEN BUILDINGS
BEING TORN DOWN AND MOVED
TO MAKE ROOM FOR
BRICK BLOCKS

West Eighth street between Olive and Charnelton is a scene of a great deal of activity just now. Several old wooden buildings are being torn down on the south side of the street to make room for the big three-story brick to be erected by F. E. Dunn and F. M. Wilkins, and across the street the work of preparing to move the old Hovey building to make room for the two-story brick to be built at the corner of West Eighth and Olive streets by the Hovey heirs was begun this morning. The small building occupied by J. A. Lash's shoe shop and G. W. Shinn's paint shop will be moved to the rear and the building on the corner will be moved to take its place. Munroe & Son, who occupy the building one door west of the paint shop and shoe shop, say they will have to move next year, as the Hoveys are talking of putting up another brick there.

Most of the old buildings on the Dunn-Wilkins site are being torn down, as they are not fit to move, but one or two on Mr. Dunn's end of the lot are being moved back to the alley.

EUGENE MAN WANTS FRANCHISE AT MT. SCOTT

B. S. KELSAY APPLIES FOR PERMIT TO LAY WATER AND GAS MAINS IN PORTLAND SUBURB

B. S. Kelsay, of Eugene, through his attorney, J. A. Finch, has filed a petition for a franchise to construct a reservoir and lay water and gas mains in the Mount Scott district, says the Oregonian. The franchise, if granted, is to cover township 1, south of range 2 east, and the west half of township 1, south of range 3 east. It is estimated that in this territory there are 8000 dwellings which have poor water supply and no gas. Kelsay says he is amply able to construct and maintain a system which will furnish an abundance of water; that he has property upon which he can construct a reservoir to hold 5,000,000 gallons. He offers to put in free 20 fire plugs, hydrants and standpipes. He is willing that the city should fix the price of water, to conform to the present charges of the city water board of the city of Portland, that price to prevail during the length of the franchise, 25 years. If the franchise is granted he offers to begin work immediately, and to have the water running in the mains within six months.
As to the gas plant, he will begin work "at an early date" and have it in operation within a year. The price of gas is not to exceed 55 cents a thousand feet.
