SOLDIER LADS ARRIVE HOME FROM ENCAMPMENT

COMPANIES A AND C CAME IN ON THIS MORNING'S TRAIN FROM AMERICAN LAKE WHERE THEY SPENT TEN DAYS IN CAMP OF INSTRUCTION—ALL REPORT A GOOD TIME

Colonel Geo. O. Yoran, of the Fourth Infantry, O. N. G., and Companies A and C returned home on the 6 o'clock train this morning from the American Lake, maneuver field, after ten days of most creditable military work. All the men were in the finest possible physical condition, tanned and hardy after the long marches in the dust and heat. No sickness was reported from exhaustion or from the bivouac Monday night in the bitter cold.

From the hour the troops reached camp until they entrained for their return to Oregon, they displayed military capacity in every move. Arriving at the maneuver field Monday, August 3, the two Oregon regiments threw up their camps in the course of a few hours, and were ready for the field at daylight the next morning. Commissary and quartermaster's departments were handled with efficiency and there was no shortage of supplies or inferiority of rations at camp or in the field at any time.

Both regiments did peculiarly effective work in the period of simulated warfare of Monday and Tuesday. They were on opposite sides, but did not come in contact with each other on the battlefield. The Third was responsible for the defeat of the Blue army on Monday, while the Fourth Infantry, in conjunction with the First and Sixth United States Infantry regiments, won Tuesday morning's engagement of the Blue force.

The boys all say this was the best encampment as regards military instruction they ever attended, and are not complaining of the hard work during their ten days of service.

EAGLES ARE SOARING HIGH AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 12.—Nomination of officers for the ensuing year and selection of the place of meeting for 1909 were the principal business before the grand aerie of the Fraternal Order of Eagles today. A hot fight has developed for the next place of meeting with Omaha, St. Paul and Saratoga Springs, N. Y., striving for the honor.

The probable new officers are: Grand worthy president, Bernard J. Monaghan, Philadelphia, Pa.; grand worthy vice president, Frank E. Herring, South Bend, Ind.; grand treasurer, Finley McKee, Helena, Mont.; grand secretary, Conrad H. Mann, Milwaukee, Wis.; grand chaplain, John A. Kline, Cleveland, O.; grand trustees, Theodore A. Bell, Napa, Cal.; W. A. Kinney, Saginaw, Mich.; Martin J. Gray, New Haven, Conn.; Henry J. Lee, Seattle.

Interest centres in the parade of Eagles attending the ninth annual grand aerie in Seattle, which takes place at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning. Fifteen thousand members of the order from all parts of the United States will be in line. In the afternoon the grand lodge officers will go to Tacoma to participate in the dedication of the new lodge hall there.

There will be no grand lodge session tomorrow. Election of officers for the ensuing year will take place Friday. Nominations were made this afternoon.

Great Growth of Order.
This morning in order to hasten the work, the convention was called to order at 8:30 instead of 10 o'clock. The reports of the grand secretary and treasurer were read and adopted.

Grand Worthy President Bell made his report, which consisted of about 5000 words. He referred to the great work of the order, mentioning especially the aid given during the Monongah mine explosion and the great fire which swept the city of Chelsea. He showed that the order has enlisted 33,834 new members during the past year. Mr. Bell's report was adopted.

The grand trustees and finance committee presented reports. These were discussed and will be approved possibly this afternoon.

Various committees are to make reports and instead of adjourning for the afternoon and attending the races at the Meadows, the convention will be in session this afternoon. The committee on organization of state aeries asked for further time and this matter was debated at length on the floor of the convention. Practically the only work so far today was the adoption of reports.

Grand Worthy President Bell announced that nominating speeches will be limited to five minutes and succeeding speeches to three minutes.

Saratoga, Omaha, St. Louis, St. Paul and Atlantic City delegates are busy securing pledges for the convention next year, but so far little advantage is perceptible.
