This Oregon has 4 electoral votes in the college, one for each senator and member of congress. The total number of electors is 483, seven more than in 1904, through the admission of Oklahoma as a state. As a rule, the vote for electors is not split, but it sometimes happens where the result is close that all those on one ticket are not successful.

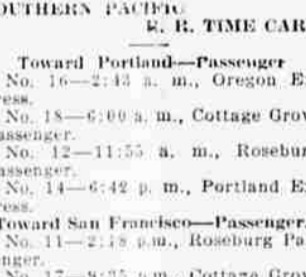
