

RIOT STIRS ILLINOIS CITY AND CAUSES BLOODSHED

As the result of an attempt by a mob to lynch a negro named George Richardson, who had assaulted a white woman. After a night of riot, arson and slaughter the state troops were called out by Governor Dineen from many points and succeeded early today in restoring a semblance of order. One thousand militiamen are patrolling the streets and it is believed that further disorder will be prevented.

MONTANA GIRL ABDUCTED FROM FATHER'S RANCH

Butte, Aug. 15.—Miss Freda Bauer, aged 16, was abducted from the ranch of her father, Conrad Bauer, twelve miles east of Billings Thursday night at the point of revolvers. There is no clue, but Bauer accuses two ranch hands, lovers of the girl, who have both disappeared. It is believed three men are implicated in the plot.

Howlert Arrested.
 Helena, Aug. 15.—A special dispatch to the Record from Billings says that John S. Howlert, known as the champion rope thrower of the world, has been arrested, charged with aiding Ernest Huston in the alleged abduction of Miss Bauer. The authorities are searching for the young woman in the vicinity of Laramie.

DYNAMITER SUSPECT ARRAIGNED IN COURT

San Francisco, Aug. 15.—Peter Claudines, with his brother John accused of complicity in the dynamiting of the home of ex-Supervisor Gallagher, principal witness for the state against Ruel, and who arrived in the city late last night from Chicago in custody of detectives, was arraigned in the police court today on the charge of criminal conspiracy. At the request of the attorneys for the defense Judge Shortall continued the case until Monday.

District Attorney Langdon declines to make any statement on the outcome of the "sweating" to which Claudines was subjected.

FIRE IN BUFFALO RAILROAD YARDS

Buffalo, Aug. 15.—Fire in the sheep sheds of the New York Central stock yards in East Buffalo, today destroyed property valued at \$300,000.

CRUISER GOES ASHORE AT DOUBLE BLUFFS

Port Townsend, Aug. 15.—The cruiser Colorado is ashore at Double Bluff in the strait of Juan de Fuca. It is learned that the Colorado went ashore in a dense fog at 9:59 o'clock this morning, and that the Revenue cutter Arcata will go to her assistance.

Double Bluff is between Port Townsend and Seattle. It is understood the cruiser is not making water and it is expected she will be floated at high tide. It is probable the tug Aswaja will be sent from Bremerton to help in floating her.

NEGRO CRIMINALS AT BLOOMINGTON

Bloomington, Aug. 15.—Richardson and James, colored men brought here from Springfield last night to escape lynching, are still in jail here in separate cells and nobody is allowed to see them. It was announced last night that they had been taken to Peoria, but this was only a ruse to forestall possible efforts to ward violence. The officers here insist that they are at Peoria.

COUNTY TREASURER VICTIM OF NEGROES

Peoria, Aug. 15.—A special dispatch from Springfield says that Assistant County Treasurer W. H. Howe was caught and shot this morning by infuriated negroes and robbed of several dollars, a watch and diamonds. Howe will probably die, five bullets entering his body.

First Regiment Ordered Out

BOND BUYERS SAY ELECTION WAS NOT LEGAL

AGENTS OF SUCCESSFUL BIDDERS IN PORTLAND NOTIFY MAYOR MATLOCK THAT ISSUE HAS BEEN TURNED DOWN BY EASTERN ATTORNEYS—CITY ATTORNEY BEAN BELIEVES THAT POSITION OF BOND BROKERS IS NOT WELL TAKEN.

Mayor Matlock this morning received a letter from the Portland representatives of Morris Bros., who were the successful bidders on Eugene water works bonds, stating that they had just received a telegram from their attorney in Chicago, who has been examining the procedure relative to the issue of the bonds, advising him that he cannot approve the bonds for the reason that sections 108 and 112 of the city charter which were amended so that the city might issue these bonds, were amended by submission on a single ballot and no opportunity afforded the voters to vote on the amendments separately, the attorney holding accordingly that this is absolutely fatal to the validity of the bonds.

Mayor Matlock at once consulted City Attorney Bean and Attorney A. C. Woodcock, counsel for the Willamette Valley Co., and they were both of the opinion that the Chicago attorney was wrong in the matter. Mr. Woodcock went to Portland this morning to confer with the representative of Morris Bros. and with the Willamette Valley Co.

City Attorney Bean, when interviewed this morning, stated that he could see nothing to warrant the declaration that the bonds were invalid. The amendments to the sections of the charter named related to the same subject matter and it would be almost impossible to segregate them.

GOVERNOR GUILD OPE RATED UPON FOR APPENDICITIS

Boston, Mass., Aug. 14.—Governor Curtis Guild, Jr., of Massachusetts, was operated upon yesterday for appendicitis, with which he was stricken while spending a vacation in the Maine woods. Physicians in attendance report that the operation was successful and that his recovery is assured.

The sudden illness of the governor came as a great surprise and shock to his family and friends, as he has been enjoying his vacation greatly. Immediately upon the discovery that he was afflicted with appendicitis he was rushed here under the care of doctors and subjected to an operation at once.

PROXI LEADER INJURED WHILE DEFENDING NEGRO

Springfield, Aug. 15.—Eugene W. Chafin, Prohibition candidate for president, was struck down by a rock while defending a negro from the attacks of a mob last night, but was not

seriously injured. Chafin threatened to shoot any man who touched the negro and reached toward his pistol pocket, but the threat had the desired result, although Chafin was unarmed.

After burning many houses in the negro quarter the mob became desperate and at 3 o'clock this morning caught Chas. Hunter, a negro, at Twelfth and Madison streets, in the heart of the district known as the "Bad Lands," and lynched him before the troops arrived on the scene. It was declared that Hunter had shot two white men in the effort to escape the mob. His body was riddled with bullets and as the body was hanging from a tree the crowd danced around it gleefully.

Troops Rushed In

Troops are being rushed to the city from all parts of the state, and negroes are leaving by every possible means. The mob spirit is still rampant, although the authorities claim to have the situation well in hand.

Despite the claim there is every chance of another clash. The negroes are well armed and are showing a spirit of determination, while the whites are in an angry mood and farmers and men from adjoining
