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REFUSAL IS RUSE OF WATER COMPANY

SUCH IS OPINION OF PORTION OF COUNCIL CONCERNING THE BOND FIRM'S REFUSAL TO TAKE ISSUE—BEAN SAYS BONDS ARE PERFECTLY LEGAL—PERHAPS NO MUNICIPAL PLANT

The city council at its session last night failed to reach any conclusion as to what action to best over the refusal of Morris Bros. to accept the bond issue, and adjourned to meet again Friday night for more discussion. For several hours the members talked the matter over pro and con, with more or less heat, a number of diversified opinions being held.

The opinion was freely expressed by Mayor Matlock and some members that the rejection of the bonds by Morris Brothers was a scheme of the Willamette Valley Company to get the plant back. They thought that the company would refuse their share of the \$300,000 issue when it was offered in payment of the present plant.

City Attorney Bean reiterated his opinion that the bonds are perfectly legal, adding that in no other way is it possible to proceed under the statutes. The Chicago attorney, who bears a national reputation as a bond expert, in some way has become confused, is the opinion expressed by Mr. Bean.

May Not Take Plant While most of the councilmen wanted to take the plant over and pay for it in a few days, the opinion was vigorously expressed by other members that unless the gravity system was put through the purchase of the present equipment is useless. Those who supported this opinion thought it wiser to wait until the October election and get an expression of the will of the people again before purchasing the Willamette Valley Company's plant.

In opposition to this Councilman Williams thought the only course open was to consummate the will of the people as already expressed and to buy the plant. He thinks the bonds should be tested before the supreme court, and then re-advertised and sold to local capital, if outside buyers will not take them up.

The city attorney reported that the Willamette Valley Company had presented deeds for the property to be turned over to the city in the water plant deal, and after correcting a few clerical errors they were all right. He stated that he was looking over the abstracts, but as they were large and voluminous it would take him a day or two yet to complete the examination.

The city attorney reported that a deed to the city for a strip of land extending West Eleventh street to city limits on the West had been made by Messrs. Vaughn and Wallis and their wives. By motion the deed was accepted and ordered recorded by the city attorney, and he was also ordered to draw an ordinance for grading and graveling the same and the city engineer was instructed to establish the grade thereon.

Reuben Greer presented the matter of blasting at the quarry, showing rocks that had been thrown into his yard where six little children were at play, one little girl being hit. The matter was referred to the street committee with instructions to take some action at once. The rock which struck little Deletie McCorn weighed half a pound. Another which struck the sidewalk behind her weighed a pound and a half.

A communication was received from the railroad officials stating that they would not allow an automobile garage for gasoline cars on their right of way.

W. J. Warnock's petition to have his scales remain on East Park street after it was paved was discussed for about half an hour, almost every member taking a round, and two members of the street committee opposing the petition if the scales were not put in according to their instructions.

Ordinarily the hops should be in blossom the latter part of July and the hops should ripen within three weeks after coming out of the burr. This year, it is stated by those who have been touring the county and viewing conditions generally, that not to exceed 30 per cent of the fields have yet come out of the blossom and that those yards which have "hopped out" are in the early stages of advancement. This condition, it is said, is due to the prolonged dry spell in most cases and to lack of cultivation in others. However, there will be plenty of hops and to spare when the harvest is over.

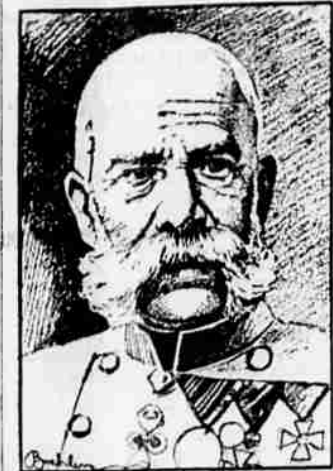

EMPEROR FRANCIS JOSEPH'S BIRTHDAY

Vienna, Aug. 18.—The Austro-Hungarian Emperor, the venerable Francis Joseph, today celebrated his seventy-eighth birthday, as is customary, in retirement in the imperial summer villa at Ischl. The anniversary was observed throughout the empire, but the elaborate public fetes originally contemplated have been deferred until next December, when the emperor will celebrate his sixtieth accession to the imperial crown. The health of Francis Joseph is reported to be better now than it has been for a long time past. At Ischl he is up every morning at 5 o'clock, and after a light breakfast he walks for an hour or so. At 7 o'clock the courier arrives from Vienna with the dispatches, and then the emperor devotes four or five hours to business

of state. At 11 o'clock he has a light luncheon, followed by dinner at 2:30, when there sit down to table with him an adjutant, the private physician and the court chaplain. The afternoon is spent in walking or shooting, and at 7 a light supper is served, and then comes some music, after which the emperor retires—usually between 8 and 9.
