

SYDNEY PREPARES TO WELCOME BIG FLEET

Aug. 13.—Sydney is en-joying the visit of the fleet and thousands of visitors from the interior have come to pay homage to the warships the whole of the harbor is to be brilliantly lighted each night, the municipalities at the expense of the state and local governments, and the shore is being decorated with flags and bunting. The complete program of the ceremonies and entertainment incident to the ten days' stay in Sydney is as follows:

Aug. 20—Arrival of the fleet, which will be welcomed outside the harbor by the fleet and other vessels from the north coast towns, and inside by a great aquatic demonstration, all available craft lining the fairway. The rest of the day will be occupied by official visits and in the evening an official dinner will be given by the federal authorities at Government House.

Aug. 21—Landing of representative units and an official reception of the admirals by the Prime Minister of the commonwealth, Mr. Deakin, and the State Premier, Mr. Wade, on the Outer Domain, in the presence of Lord Northcote and Admiral Sir Harry Rawson. Then will follow a march through the city, and in the evening there will be a state official dinner, the crews being entertained at the theatres.

Aug. 22—The sailors will be taken on excursions by railway to some of the most beautiful places in New South Wales, including the Blue Mountains and the Zenonian Caves. The afternoon will be occupied with a regatta and land sports. In the evening Vice Admiral Sir Richard Poore, commanding the Australian squadron, will give a dinner and the day will conclude with extensive illuminations in the harbor.

Aug. 23—There will be voluntary church parades.

Aug. 24—A review will be held in Centennial Park. A federal official ball will be held in the evening, and entertainments will be given by the citizens and the federal non-commissioned officers.

Aug. 25—A gymkhana, including specially Australian sports. In the evening a reception by the mayor, and federal theatre parties.

Aug. 26—A demonstration by public school children, a garden party by the governor and railway excursions to points of interest.

Aug. 27—The fleet departs from Sydney for Melbourne.

FOURTH OREGON HIGH AT CAMP PERRY

In the championship team match, Sydney will be performed jointly by Admiral Sperry and Admiral Rawson.

Sydney is decorated as never before in its history. The leading streets are gay with flags and bunting, the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack being seen on every hand. Pictures of President Roosevelt, King Edward, Admiral Sperry, Admiral Rawson and the Earl of Dudley are also included in the decorations.

EXAMINATION FOR TEACHERS IN PHILIPPINES

Examinations may be taken on the 25th and 26th of this month for the position of assistant teacher in the Philippines, from which position teachers may work into higher positions as they show their ability. The salary ranges for the first year from \$1000 to \$1200.

The qualifications are about equivalent to a high school education. The places in this state are Baker City, Eugene, Portland and Astoria. Women applicants may apply also, so long as they are either a daughter or close relative, or wife or fiancée of some male teacher, either going or already in the Philippines. The number of positions are limited, however. The salary ranges between \$900 and \$1100.

The school year in the Philippines begins in June and ends in March.
