The Booth-Kelly Lumber Company is making splendid progress on its logging road out of Wondling. The Springfield and Co. plans are now in operation and shipments are going forth from all four mills.

For the accuracy of the surveys, such a notice can be made in the field notes, and the surveyor can find the corner by going to the place mentioned.
