Joseph E. Ralph, director of the bureau of engraving and printing at Washington, was born in Allegheny City, Pa., August 22, 1863, but spent most of his boyhood in Joliet, Ill. After leaving school he started to work in a machine shop. From an apprentice boy he worked his way upward until he became an expert mechanic and superintendent of a large iron and steel works. He became the head of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, which position first brought him into public notice. He was appointed assistant postmaster of the house of representatives and while holding this position he took a course in law at the Georgetown University. His next position was that of superintendent of construction at Ellis Island, and next he was appointed deputy collector of the customs department of the Chicago world's fair. In 1906 he became assistant director of the bureau of engraving and printing, and last year upon the death of Director Thomas J. Sullivan, Mr. Ralph was appointed to fill the vacancy.

EMMONS OF SPRINGFIELD GETS \$10,000 CONTRACT

The contract for the construction of the Odd Fellows building on the corner of Main street and Spaulding avenue, says the Brownsville Times, has been let to Contractor E. J. Emmons, of Springfield, who will commence work next week, probably on Monday. The structure will cost over \$10,000. The bid of Mr. Emmons was \$9500, but that did not include the excavating, which was done by the Odd Fellows.

The building is to be 45x95 feet, two stories and basement. The lower story will contain two store rooms facing on Spaulding avenue, the corner room already being leased for a term of years to the Brownsville Hardware Company, the new firm which bought out David Sterling. The second story will be used exclusively by the Odd Fellows for lodge purposes, making them a very fine home.

RAILS FOR EXTENSION SPRINGFIELD LINE DUE

The Willamette Valley Company will operate their cars to the Willamette river as soon as the rails arrive for the first time from the northern railroad junction point. The rails have been due for some time. Manager James Welch says, the rails having not this morning for Newport. Arrived somewhere between Eugene and Denver.

The company has been using money all summer by not having the line completed to the river, for the passenger traffic to that point would be almost as large as though the line ran into Springfield proper.

ADDITIONAL SCHOOL BONDS ARE VOTED

Junetion City, Aug. 21.—With only two dissenting votes Junetion City school district voted \$2000 additional school bonds. The money will be used to install steam heaters and other improvements in both the public and high school.

The new \$8000 high school building will be finished in time for the reception of pupils at the September term. The structure is modern throughout, and is surrounded by a yard which will be beautified with trees and flowers.

It is the intention to have a 12-grade high school.

BED BUGS CAUSED FIRE RUN LAST NIGHT

WARREN COMPANY WILL PAVE ROSEBURG'S STREETS

Roseburg, Aug. 21.—At a special meeting of the city council this evening final action on the paving of 18 blocks of the main streets of the city was taken. The contract was let to the Warren Construction Company, of Portland, the only bidder. Work is to commence within ten days and be rushed to completion. Bids for the purchase of the \$35,000 street improvement bonds to be issued by the city of Roseburg and the bid of Morris Bros., of Portland, was accepted. The owners of the property abutting the paving to be done are to pay one-half the expense incurred, and not one protest was filed.

Curious thing about it is that a merchant who would think it absurd to have a run-down or out-of-repair clock will, sometimes, deliberately let his ad stop running. It's not wise, nor good business, nor defensible on any known grounds—but it is sometimes done.
