STEAMER WILL RUN TO EUGENE FROM PORTLAND

Mr. R. J. Galbraith, of Corvallis, was in the city on his way to Portland to buy a boiler for his new boat, Uncle Sam, which will soon be launched, an opposition boat to the monopoly which has long prevailed in the Willamette. It will be one hundred feet long, twenty feet wide, and have a capacity of 125 tons and about one hundred passengers. The engine was made by Watson Bros. of this city, and will have 70 horse power. The boat will draw fifteen inches unloaded. Mr. Galbraith intends to run between Eugene and Portland and give the people living rates.—Albany Democrat.
