**READY NOW FOR  
KERN NOTIFICATION**

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 24.—Men who will be prominent in the notification of John W. Kern of his nomination for vice-president of the United States on the democratic ticket began to arrive in the city today. With the exception of a few finishing touches everything is in readiness for tomorrow's exercises. Indianapolis, in holiday dress for the occasion, is preparing to entertain a large number of visitors. The program provides that all the ceremonies of notification shall take place at the State Fair grounds in the daytime, and that there will be no downtown demonstration and no street parade. Nevertheless, it is expected that the attendance of numerous democratic clubs, enthused by the presence in the city of William J. Bryan, and a host of prominent party leaders, will result in an impromptu demonstration of some sort tomorrow night. It is hoped that some of the visiting orators may be induced to deliver public speeches. The notification exercises at the State Fair grounds will take place in the Colosseum, which is one of the largest and finest amphitheatres in the country. Arrangements are being made to accommodate a crowd of 15,000 people in the huge structure. A speaker's stand has been erected at one end of the building. The stand has been made large enough to afford seating capacity for the members of the notification committee, the members of the national committee who will be in attendance and a number of specially invited guests. The notification speech and the address of acceptance by Mr. Kern will be brief in order to give ample time for the delivery of the speech of Mr. Bryan on the subject of trusts, which, of course, will be the chief feature of the program. Mr. Bryan is expected to reach the city early tomorrow morning from Chicago accompanied by National Chairman Mack. Both of the distinguished leaders will be guests of Mr. and Mrs. Kern while in the city.

**GREAT ACT OF  
BARNUM & BAILEY'S  
FAMOUS CIRCUS**

The sensations of a man who is carried around by elephants whose trunks are wrapped around his neck and legs must be of decidedly an unusual nature, and Harry Mooney, the chief elephant trainer with Barnum & Bailey's circus, was asked about it the other day. "I really don't know what are my sensations," he said. "I never have time to think of anything but keeping the elephants in their proper positions. I give most of my attention to Pilot when he has his trunk around my neck. "I began training my present herd only last winter, and every day I put them through their act three or four times. To accustom them to bear the burden of my weight, I first began with a straw dummy which weighed only three or four pounds. I added to this dummy about a pound a day until its weight was equal to my own. I put around the neck of the dummy an iron band which has sharp points about one-eighth of an inch in length all around it. These points I had

covered with very soft leather, so that any great pressure upon them—exceeding the pressure caused by the weight itself—would cause these points to penetrate the leather and pierce Pilot's trunk. It does not take him long to learn that if he exerted any undue pressure or enticed his trunk in closer or tighter it would hurt him. "An elephant's trunk, powerful as it is, is extremely sensitive. It can feel the bite of a fly, and it may be interesting to know that when you see elephants throwing dirt and hay upon their backs, it is to drive flies away. Their skins, while thick, are very sensitive. The same principle is applied to prevent the huge six-ton elephant, Paul, from injuring me while kneeling down over me. "The general idea of the great intelligence of the elephants is correct, but the idea that they are in love with their trainers and would not injure them is erroneous. In handling elephants stern vigilance is always the price of life. I have never known an exception to this fact, and while we gain their affection to a degree, we must never rely upon it, but be ever ready to meet whatever whim or mood seizes them. "They are particularly cranky in rainy weather—they are perfect barometers. We can tell with absolute accuracy the approach of a storm by the actions of the elephants. We can almost gauge the very minute when a storm will arrive, and during a storm they must be carefully guarded. I think they are actuated by fear of the elements more than anything else. Singularly enough, they are all right in a storm when not under cover, so when a storm begins they will make every effort to break away from their chains and get out into the rain. Once in the rain they become docile enough and seem to have no fear."

With the Barnum & Bailey menagerie this year are thirty elephants, both the Asiatic and African varieties being represented.

**WASHINGTON TAKEN  
NINETY-FOUR YEARS AGO**

Washington, D. C., Aug. 24.—Ninety-four years ago today a British army, under the command of General Ross, entered the city of Washington, having defeated 6,000 American soldiers on their way. The capital was abandoned to the invaders. President Madison and other high officials of the government having left the city before the arrival of the British. In revenge for a Washingtonian having attempted to kill General Ross, whose life was saved at the expense of his horse, the British attempted to burn the capital. That building was saved, but the congressional library was destroyed, and with it many valuable historical documents. The torch was applied also to the White House, the treasury and the war and state departments, and before the British evacuated the city, and the flames were extinguished, property valued at \$2,000,000 had been destroyed, and in addition several score of Americans were killed or wounded.

**NEWS BREVITIES.**

Corvallis has good prospects for a fine new hotel. The Albany wire works, recently burned, is being rebuilt. The Oregon prune growers' associating is buying up prune packing plants in order to fight the buyers' trust. The Cunard liner Lusitania finished a sensational run across the Atlantic at 9:30 o'clock Thursday night, and when the official figures for the trip became available after the liner had anchored outside the bar for the night, it developed that the big turbine had not only lowered all records for the trans-Atlantic voyage by nearly four hours, but that she had also broken three other records. The run was made in four days and 15 hours.
