## GREAT RACE MEET IN MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, Mass., Aug. 24.—The promise of the New England Breeders' association that the grand circuit meeting at Readville this year should be an occasion that would make a brilliant page in turf history seems already certain of fulfillment. The meeting today opened under most favorable auspices and all that is needed to make it the banner meeting of the year is six days of sunshine.

The keystone of the meeting is the \$50,000 American trotting Derby, which is to be decided tomorrow. The purse is the largest ever offered for trotters and has drawn the cream of the country's racing material. It is predicted that the crowd that will turn out to see the great prize won and lost will be the largest that ever witnessed a turf event in New England.

The Derby is to be decided on the handicap dash system, which has made trotting so popular in Australia, but which has never had a fair trial in America. The event will be a dash of one mile and one quarter for horses with records not faster than 2:15. Horses with lower records will have to go a greater distance.

The conditions governing the race are as follows: Fifty thousand dollar handicap, dash race, open to all trotters, in which the slower horse will go one mile and one-quarter and be allowed fifty feet start by faster horses for each second's difference in speed, but no horse will be handicapped slower than up to a mile in 2:15.

The first horse will get \$30,000 second, \$10,000, third, \$5,000, fourth, \$2,500, fifth, \$1,500, sixth, \$1,000.

## FRUIT GROWERS FROM MISSOURI ARE IN OREGON

(Special Correspondence.)

Portland, Ore., Aug. 24.—Fifty thousand southerly postal cards showing the magnificent Oregon State Building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition have already been circulated, and one hundred thousand more have been ordered. This building is considered by many as erected at an exposition. The Portland Commercial Club will send one of these cards for the asking.

Mr. A. Decker, one of the best known of American magazine writers, is making a tour of Oregon in behalf of the "World Today." The committee in ways and means appointed by the Oregon Good Roads Conference have arranged for a Good Roads Convention at Tillamook September 4, and another at Roseburg September 22. Other meetings are under consideration and definite dates will be decided on within a few days. There is universal determination to make this campaign the most effective the state has ever experienced.

Owners of famous horses, as well as breeders of fancy stock are coming to Portland daily from all parts of the country to see the marvelous grounds and track of the Portland Country Club and Live Stock Association. The show will open September 21 and continue a week—track and barns will be entirely completed by the opening day. No matter how much visitors may expect, they will not be disappointed, for the whole situation is ideal.

President William P. Stark and three members of the Missouri State Board of Horticulture will spend two entire weeks in Oregon before they complete their tour of the state. The name of Stark is well known to every fruit grower in America, and the good opinion of these gentlemen is worth much to the state.

The great irrigation districts of Malheur and Klamath counties were represented in Portland this week by Messrs. W. H. Doolittle, secretary of the Ontario commercial club, and R. H. Dunbar, secretary of the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce.

## PACIFIC FLEET ON LONG CRUISE

San Francisco, Aug. 24.—The first and second divisions of the Pacific fleet, accompanied by a flotilla of torpedo boats, leaves San Francisco today bound on a 2100-mile trip to Honolulu. The fleet will reach its destination September 3 or 4, and after a week's stop for coaling purposes will proceed to Samoa, 2240 miles distant. From Samoa the fleet will return to Honolulu, engaging in a series of maneuvers on the way, and from Honolulu will go to Magdalena Bay for the final target practice.

The fleet comprises the eight armored cruisers Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Colorado, Maryland, South Dakota, California, Washington, and Tennessee; the fleet tender Charleston; the Solace, the parent ship of the torpedo vessels, and the torpedo boat destroyers Whipple, Hopkins, Truxton, Perry, Farragut, Stewart and Preble.

On the return trip the fleet is scheduled to arrive at San Diego on October 28. The vessels will depart from San Diego two days later for Magdalena Bay, where they are due November 1. The entire month of November will be spent in target practice at Magdalena Bay. On December 4 the fleet will return to San Francisco.

## ALLEGED NEVADA LAND FRAUD CASES

Carson, Nev., Aug. 24.—An important suit involving alleged land frauds will be called for trial in the federal court tomorrow. Five thousand acres of rich lands in Washoe and Humboldt are involved.

The government contends that when the titles to the land were procured by the Central Pacific R. R., the Southern Pacific and the United States Trust company, it was with the understanding that there were no known minerals in the land. It is now sought to have the patents revoked on the ground that the companies named knew of the existence of the minerals in the land when the titles were secured. The case for the government will be conducted by United States District Attorney Platt.

### JUDGE TAFT PROMISES SPEEDY REVISION OF TARIFF

Hot Springs, Va., Aug. 22.—Just what are Mr. Taft's views regarding the revision of the tariff were incidentally expressed by him today.

"If elected," he said, "I shall call the Sixty-first Congress together in extraordinary session to revise the tariff at the very earliest moment. I have authority to do so. I consider such action to be my obligation under the tariff plank of the Republican platform."

Mr. Bryan's tariff speech has not reached here, and the above statement was made without reference to what the Democratic nominee has said on the subject, but in answer to a query as to how Mr. Taft interpreted the Republican tariff plank.

### BRYAN WILL FIGHT FOR NEW YORK

Chicago, Aug. 22.—William J. Bryan will make a determined effort to place New York state in the Democratic column. Plans to this end were carefully laid today at a three-hour conference of Mr. Bryan, National Chairman Mack, heads of various bureaus of the national committee, and members of the executive committee at Democratic headquarters, shortly after Mr. Bryan's arrival here from Des Moines.

Mr. Bryan will speak in New York, Syracuse and Rochester between September 16 and 20, and early in October will again speak in New York City and in Buffalo. Reports received by Chairman Mack gave strong hope to Mr. Bryan and members of the national committee that the Democrats could carry New York if Mr. Bryan would speak in the principal centers of the state.

Send Kern to Pacific Coast. It was further developed at the conference that Mr. Bryan would make a sharp fight in the Middle West, while John W. Kern, the vice presidential candidate, would likely be called upon to make an extended tour of the Pacific coast states.
