

**Notice to Contractors and Property Owners.**

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the terms of Ordinance No. 775, passed by the Common Council of the City of Eugene, August 13, 1908, bids will be received by the street committee of the Council in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Eugene until 7:30 o'clock p. m., Monday August 31st, 1908, for the improvement of Fifth street from Olive street to Willamette street in the city of Eugene, by the construction of cement curbing along both sides of said street and by paving the same between said points with bitulithic, asphalt, or other hard surface pavement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor, now on file in the office of the City Recorder.

Bidders are required to state the price in detail in accordance with the specifications, and on the form prepared by the City Engineer. Separate contracts will be awarded to the lowest bidder for the construction of said curbing; for the paving and for the drainage. The said improvements shall be completed within ninety days from the date of letting the contracts therefor.

The work to be done under the supervision of the Street Committee and to be approved by them. An approved bond will be required of each contractor for the faithful performance of the contract. A certified check in a sum equal to five per cent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid. The Street Committee reserves the right to reject any or all bids by order of the Common Council.

**APE STANDS ON ITS HEAD**

Remarkable Animal Clown joins the Barnum & Bailey Circus.

An ape that stands on its head is the latest laugh-compelling circus feature. As is usual with all good things, it is a part of the performance given this season by the Barnum & Bailey greatest show on earth—being a member of the company of animal comedians just brought from Europe by the three Menstines, who are touring America for the first time with this big circus.

In costume, properties, tentage, flags, trappings and parade equipment it is an entirely new show. The parade, again in evidence, is all of recent European make. It is scheduled for 10 o'clock in the forenoon. The main program is given almost without exception by artists new to America and picked with a view to variety and novelty from the best of Europe and Asia.

The display is capped by the thrilling double automobile somersault performed by the LaRaque Sisters. The act is said to "out-limit" all the limits of the past.
