### WARM GREETING FOR BRYAN AT TOPEKA

Topeka, Kas., Aug. 27.—The capital city of Kansas today was the mecca for Democrats from three states, come to hear William J. Bryan speak on the subject of the guaranty deposit law for banks. The speech, as previously announced, was to form one of the "keynotes" of the Democratic national campaign. On his arrival from the East Mr. Bryan was met at the train by a local reception committee and the members of the Democratic state committee of Kansas. Through streets which were decorated for the occasion the Democratic presidential candidate was escorted to the Hotel Thropp, where luncheon was served. The state authorities having refused authority for the speech-making to take place on the grounds of the capitol, it was decided to hold the demonstration at the city park, where an immense crowd congregated an hour or more before the time scheduled for the appearance of Mr. Bryan. Several bands furnished music for the occasion, and there were introductory speeches from prominent representatives of the Democratic party in Kansas. Mr. Bryan rode in an open carriage from the hotel to the park, and was greeted all along the route with cheers from the crowds that thronged the sidewalks. Another rousing innovation awaited him when he appeared on the speaker's platform and was introduced to the vast assemblage that filled the park and overran into the adjoining streets.

### NOTES OF THE DAY'S NEWS IN BRIEF

Washington, D. C., Aug. 27.—The battleships Alabama and Maine, which have been detached from the Atlantic battleship fleet and are proceeding the trip around the world, are due to arrive tomorrow at Aden, whence they will proceed through the Red Sea and Suez canal to the Mediterranean.

Racine, Wis., Aug. 27.—A lively pugilistic bout is expected here tonight when Danny Goodman and Al Wolgast come together for a ten-round bout. It will be their second encounter. In their first meeting Wolgast disposed of Goodman in four rounds. Since then, however, Goodman has engaged in fifteen bouts and never lost a decision.

Waterloo, Ia., Aug. 27.—Many visitors are here for the annual convention of the Iowa Association for the Deaf, which opened today for a three days' session. The sign language will be employed for all of the addresses and discussions, which will concern principally the recent improvements in methods for the education of the deaf and dumb.

Asbury Park, Aug. 27.—The Asbury Park conference of the Christian Socialist Fellowship opened here today with delegates present from Connecticut, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland and Delaware. The speakers this afternoon included Miss May Coghlan Fitzpatrick, of Brooklyn, the Rev. Maurice Thorner, of New York, Rev. James L. Smiley, of Annapolis, and George H. Strobel, of Newark.

Freeport, Ill., Aug. 27.—A big celebration was held here today in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of the second great Lincoln-Douglas debate, which was held in Freeport August 27, 1858. General Smith D. Atkins presided at the anniversary exercises and the prominent speakers included Senator Dooliver, of Iowa, Colonel W. G. Davidson, of Lewiston, and Congressman Frank D. Lowden.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 27.—For the next three days the eyes of our men throughout the Northwest will be turned toward Astoria, where the fourteenth annual regatta of the lower Columbia river opened today under favorable auspices. The program provides for a number of marine and land spectacles, in addition to the usual aquatic sports, yacht racing, launch racing and rowing contests.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 27.—The Most Rev. Patrick W. Riordan, archbishop of San Francisco, was sixty-six years old today, having been born in New Brunswick, August 27, 1842. Next month his grace will celebrate the silver jubilee anniversary of his consecration as an archbishop.

New York, Aug. 27.—The Eastern headquarters of the Democratic National committee were formally opened today, and by the first of the coming week it is expected to have all of the campaign machinery in perfect running order. The committee occupies nineteen rooms on the parlor floor of the Hoffman House, which has served as Democratic headquarters in New York for a number of years.

A feature of the convention is the attendance of a large delegation of woman suffragists, who want the convention to adopt a plank submitting the suffrage question to the people.
