## DOUBLE CAPACITY OF CORVALLIS LUMBER PLANT

The capacity of the Corvallis sawmill, which is now owned by Eugene people, now 20,000 feet daily, is to be doubled within a short time. The announcement was made Saturday by G. O. Bassett, one of the owners, who is to be the resident manager of the property. Mr. Bassett has been manager for the Booth-Keely Company at Springfield and other mills for nine years, and is an expert in the lumber business as well as in matters financial. His family arrived in Corvallis this week and Mr. Bassett will assume personal charge of the mill in about ten days.

The machinery for the increased capacity has already been ordered. It will be installed piecemeal, as time and occasion will permit, and without a shut down of the machinery, which will be kept going steadily. The new machines are of the latest patterns, and when finally installed, the local mill will be one of the finest in the Western Oregon country. The name of the company is the Occidental Lumber Company.

The company now employs 30 men, and when the capacity is increased the force will be larger. It is planned to keep the mill running steadily. A large supply of logs is now in the stream, and others will be available as fast as the three million feet in the present holdings are manufactured into lumber. They come from up the McKenzie, and are the finest logs obtainable. A hundred thousand feet of clear lumber has been sawed and placed in the yard since the mill started up, and it is now sufficiently seasoned for dressing and manufacture into flooring, rustic and other kinds of house material. A dozen carloads of dressed lumber to meet pressing orders have arrived within the last few days from mills up the McKenzie.

Mr. Bassett is a live, wide-awake business man, and a welcome addition to the business life of Corvallis. —Times.

### Notice to Contractors and Property Owners.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the terms of Ordinance No. 786, passed by the Common Council of the City of Eugene, August 13, 1908, bids will be received by the street committee of the Council in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Eugene until 7:30 o'clock p. m., Monday August 31st, 1908, for the improvement of Sixth street from Olive street to the West side of the alley between Willamette and Oak streets in the City of Eugene, by the construction of cement curbing along both sides of said street and by paving the same between said points with bitulithic, asphalt, or other hard surface pavement in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor, now on file in the office of the City Recorder.

Bidders are required to state the price in detail in accordance with the specifications, and on the form prepared by the City Engineer. Separate contracts will be awarded to the lowest bidder for the construction of said curbing; for the paving and for the drainage. The said improvements shall be completed within ninety days from the date of letting the contracts therefor.

The work to be done under the supervision of the Street Committee and to be approved by them. An approved bond will be required of each contractor for the faithful performance of the contract. A certified check in a sum equal to five percent of the amount bid, payable to J. D. Matlock, Mayor, is required to accompany each bid. ### GOLDEN TROUT EGGS TO BE DISTRIBUTED SOON

Chance for Lovers of McKenzie to Add Another Charm to Stream—Fish Is Gamey

The McKenzie river can be stocked with the gamey and showiest trout in America if the sportsmen will organize and as soon as possible buy the eggs from the government of the famous Golden (Rosen) trout, which have been found in only one stream, and that on the side of Mount Whitney, California. Such a trout would add to the variety of the McKenzie, which already has the reputation of being an ideal trout stream.

The Roosevelt golden trout at present is the product solely of Volcano creek, a turbulent stream of 15 miles in length on the slopes of Mount Whitney, Cal. Two years ago some of President Roosevelt's friends in California appealed to him to save from extermination this most beautiful fish. Until by presidential proclamation Mount Whitney was made a forest reserve, anglers in large numbers visited the section and preyed upon the Roosevelt golden trout.

Responding to appeal in behalf of the fish, which subsequently was named for him, President Roosevelt took up the matter with the United States fish commission. After repeated efforts the commission obtained a number of the fish which were sent to the fish cultural station at Hozomean, Mont., and Leadville, Colo., for propagation. Encouraging news has been received from these stations to the effect that sufficient quantity of eggs has been obtained for hatching the stock through streams in different parts of the country.
