1726—General John Stark, victor of the battle of Bennington on August 16, 1777, was born at Londonderry, N. H., and died at Chester, N. H., May 5, 1822.

Francis G. Newlands.  
Francis G. Newlands, one of the two Democratic United States senators from the Far West, is a son of Nevada, which he represents, by adoption only. He was born at Natchez, Miss., on August 28, 1848, and received his education at Yale and the Columbian College of Law at Washington, D. C. After his admission to the bar, he went to San Francisco, where he met with great success in his profession. In 1888 he moved to Nevada, where he was elected a member of congress to the 53 congress. He was re-elected four times and finally became the successor of Senator John J. Jones on March 4, 1903. He is greatly interested in transportation matters and was appointed by President Roosevelt a member of the Inland Waterways Commission.
