SAFELY GUARDED SECRET
A Public Singer's First Experience With a Phonograph

The mechanical process of obtaining records for the phonograph will probably never be generally revealed to the general public. That it is a

safely-guarded secret was attested by Jose, the contra-tenor, in a recent interview.

"Secret!" exclaimed Jose. "It's the most secret thing in the world—for the singer. You're locked all alone with the band in a big bare room. Your back is to the musicians and your feet to a bleak, blank wall through which protrudes a solemn horn. Into this contrivance you sing. Not a soul in sight. A bell rings—one. That's to get ready. Mouth to the horn and hands down; for the receiving instrument is so sensitive that if you moved your sleeve against your coat the sound would register. Somebody outside the room presses the button—two. The band starts the prelude, then you sing, turning neither to the right nor left, always looking and aiming into that protruding horn. And you mustn't close your lips on it and wait for the little whirl within the horn to cease.

No outsider is allowed to penetrate behind the wall. There are doors leading into the recording room, but if one should attempt to open them he would receive an electric shock that would put him out of business for a while.

"The result is heard in hardly no time. And if you are new to the game it nearly kills you. When I first heard my own voice I turned clammy all over and shook like a frightened child. I had to be quieted down before I could go on with the next ballad. No man knows what his own voice sounds like till he hears it reproduced by a machine. He can't know otherwise; his auditory appara-
