

DISPENSATORY CIRCUS PARADE

DELIGHTS GREAT THROG OF PEOPLE

GLITTERING PAGEANT OVER A MILE LONG PASSED BETWEEN CROWDED SIDEWALKS OF EUGENE TODAY—THOUSANDS ATTEND PERFORMANCES IN SPITE OF FREQUENT SHOWERS DURING DAY

Complete performance of Barnum & Bailey's show tonight, regardless of the weather. Doors open at 7 p. m., performance at 8 p. m.

All roads lead to "Circusville" today, located upon Kincaid field, where the Barnum & Bailey greatest show on earth has pitched its temporary habitat and will give two performances today.

Included among the latter were anered cattle from India, zebras, llamas, alpacas, zebras, yaks, etc., forming a motley caravan and marching in grotesque fashion to the show grounds.

The performers and business staff breakfasted later and with just as much zeal and healthy appetites in evidence.

The mammoth parade was witnessed by thousands whose emphatic approval of the fine spectacle was voiced by the small boy's comment: "Gee! but that was a bully pe-rade."

The inevitable calliope brought up the rear and split the air with a wide repertoire of selections. With the return of the parade to the grounds the latter became the mecca for hundreds who witnessed the various free shows and by the time the ticket wagons were besieged with patrons clamoring for the pastebords which would admit them to the circus fairland.

The menagerie drew the attention of thousands and it was the general verdict that the animal display was far and away the most varied and comprehensive ever shown here.

In one end of the huge tent three giraffes (there are but seven in the country), tall, towering creatures, became an instant object of attraction.

The Performance Of the circus proper much could be said. Suffice it to say it met all expectations, and provided many novelties. The show opened with a professional prelude rich in costume effects and masterly in arrangement.
