LUMBER BUSINESS AT COTTAGE GROVE IS PICKING UP

The new 60-horsepower boiler and engine for the McKibben Brothers sawmill arrived at this place, together with their new cut-off saw, Saturday morning and was sent out to the mill site a few miles east of town over the O & S. E. railroad the same day. It will be remembered that the McKibben mill was destroyed by fire a short time ago, but the boys pluckily went to work at once rebuilding with the result that by the time the new machinery came to hand everything was in readiness for its installation and in a comparatively few days the saws were humming again. This new power equipment will give the mill a capacity of 25,000 per day and the boys expect to experience no difficulty in averaging 20,000 feet per day. Several days will be occupied in sawing lumber with which to replace the 200 feet of flume which was also destroyed at the same time the mill burned, but by the close of another week the mill will be ready to take care of its orders.

A leader representative visited the site of the new skating rink and swimming pool on Fourth street Tuesday and found that W. B. Cooper had completed the excavation for the swimming pool, 60x80 feet, five feet deep, and had most of the material for the big 80x100 foot two-story building on the ground, including gravel for the concrete foundation and pool. Carpenters will begin the work soon.

The Brown Lumber Co. pumped out their millpond this week in order to enlarge the pond and make improvements on the log dump and chute. Other extensive repairs and improvements are being made preparatory to beginning active operations again.

C. A. A. U. CHAMPIONSHIPS TO BE DECIDED

Hallfax, N. S., Aug. 29.—Seldom in the twenty-five years of field and track sports under the Canadian Amateur Athletic Union has there been such a wealth of runners, leapers and weight hurlers of high grade as gathered today for the annual championship meet on the grounds of the Wanderers' Athletic Club, nor has the outcome of the annual event ever been more in doubt. The entrants include many of the foremost amateur athletes throughout Canada.

The program for the day includes some sixteen championship events, as follows: 100 yards, 200 yards, 440 yards, 880 yards, one mile relay race, 120 yard hurdles, five mile run, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault for height, throwing the 56-pound weight, throwing the 16-pound hammer, putting the 16-pound shot, throwing the discus, and one-mile walk.

LANE COUNTY FARMERS WHO RAISE BIG CROPS

The Beldler Brothers, who are cultivating the Harding farm near town for a term of years, threshed 1500 bushels of wheat last week, 3711 bushels of oats, besides about 150 bushels of vetch seed. They also have 100 tons of hay, 7 or 8 acres of potatoes, and a large number of fat hogs and a few beehives to turn off occasionally. With wheat selling at \$1, oats 50 cents and hay \$10 and \$12, these fellows are not worrying about anything—except what to do with the money. But it requires hard work, and lots of it, to get it.—Leader.

DR. KUYKENDALL FILES ON POWER

Dr. W. Kuykendall, while on his outing at Triangle Lake last week, filed upon a water power site on Lake creek where the creek leaves the lake. He appropriated 100,000 miners' inches of the waters of the creek for electrical power purposes. The point of diversion of the proposed canal is where the creek leaves the lake and the general direction is southwesterly parallel with the creek. The canal will be 15 feet wide at the bottom and six feet deep. Dr. Kuykendall has not announced what he will do with his power site, but it is a valuable one, and it is probable that it will be improved in the near future.

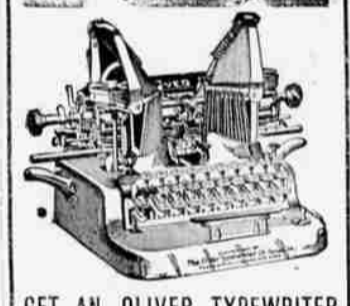

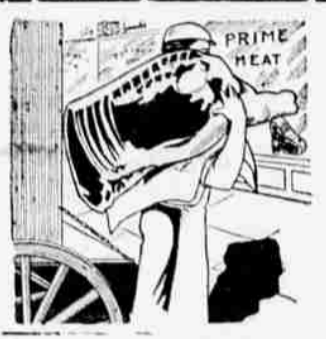
